Who Knew "Watermelon Clark"

Bedford, Iowa.

Dear Sir: I expect you think I am a long time in writing my letter to my old friends and chums in and around Jasper as you asked me to do. But I guess it is better late than never. It seems as though it takes me all the time to do my chores, as I am on a 390-acre farm and have quite a lot of stock to look after these cold days.

I will try and tell you something about this country.

It is a fine farming country around here. It is noted for its fine horses, cattle, also for corn, wheat, oats and hogs. I raise from 100 to 200 head of hogs a year. It is a fine bluegrass country and the pastures are fine the year around. My horses and cattle have lived on the pasture all winter till it snowed it under last Thursday, and they are as fat as though they had been kept in a barn and fed. There has been quite a lot of hog cholera up here the last two years. I lost 72 head two years ago.

I raise from 90 to 100 acres of corn a year, 40 to 50 acres of wheat, 30 to 35 acres of oats. Corn, wheat and oats are high here. Corn is 70 cents, wheat is \$1.40, and oats 45 cents.

Elsie Clark of Barton County is one of my near neighbors. I expect he would be better known around Jasper as "Watermelon Clark." I see a great many of my old friends are around Jasper yet. I am always glad when I get my Jasper paper, and my wife can read it to me as I do not read very much. It bothers me to as I can only read with one eye. I had my left eye hurt three years ago and it has a scar over the sight and can't hardly see.

Any time any of my old friends would like to come up and look at the country around here I would like to show it to them. Bedford is just 70 miles north of St. Joe, Mo., on the C. B. & Q. Railroad.

Will close with wishing you and all my old friends a happy and successful new year.

A number are at Jasper or near there yet. Many have changed their names. I saw the death of one of my teacher's week before last, Maude Martin.

We are located in Decatur County on the southwest corner farm of said County, one mile south of Alert, Ind., a thriving little village of only a few hundred, but a good shipping point, good elevators, stock buyers, merchants,

a good graded school, two churches and a new State Bank just organized with \$25,000 no capital and is doing a thriving business, also a telephone exchange. Have a telephone in our home and can talk anywhere from the small place to Indianapolis.

We are at the southern edge of the level or glacial land. To the south are a great many hills or rough land, while to the north is to be found some of the nicest as well as the richest farms to be found anywhere, so you can

readily see that there is land of all prices to suit the purchaser from \$30 up to \$200 and even higher.

This has been a timbered country of oak, hickory, poplar, maple and beech, but most of the valuable timber has been cut and nothing much remains but beech and maple.

We raise corn, wheat, rye, oats, and so forth.


