

### Order and Frequency of Feeding.

A question often asked is whether milk cows should be fed grain or roughage first. Some even think cows should be fed three times a day to induce the heaviest production. Of course, this is done when very high producing cows are being fed for records. Cows have a big paunch capacity and in ordinary practice feeding twice daily is a reasonable rule to follow. Where cows have the freedom of a yard during the day, it is a good plan for them to have some roughage in racks to pick over between regular feeds. Cows are creatures of habit, and regularity in whatever practice is adopted is of the greatest importance.

From a physiological standpoint, it does not make much difference whether the grain or roughage is fed first. In the processes of digestion the churning movements of the paunch thoroughly mix the hay and the concentrate. The principal thing is to keep the cow satisfied. As a rule she will eat her roughage more contentedly after she has been fed her allowance of concentrates or grain.

In some herds cows are fed grain while being milked. This quickly becomes a habit and they will not give down their milk unless the grain is in the feed box.

The handling of roughage always stirs up dust, and for this reason the milking should be done and the milk removed from the barn before the roughage is fed.

Silage has an odor which will be absorbed by the milk if it is fed during milking or before the milk has been removed from the barn. Therefore, silage should not be fed until after milking—Kansas Farmer.


