Obituary.

William Marion Harvey was born in Clermont County, Ohio, October 9, 1829; died at the home of his son, A. M. Harvey, June 21, 1916; age 86 years, 8 months and 12 days, death resulting from his advanced age.

While still a child he moved with his parents to Allen County, Ohio, where he grew to young manhood.

He was married to Hannah Wine March 23, 1854. Immediately after their marriage they emigrated to Keokuk County, Iowa, where they lived fifteen years. In 1869 they moved to Jasper County, Mo., and for the past 47 years lived on his farm four miles southeast of Jasper.

To this happy union were born ten children, two of whom, one son and one daughter, preceded him to the spirit world. Amos Harvey, Mrs. D. H. Wampler and Mrs. William Greenwood live near Jasper; Mrs. D. W. Copeland and Mrs. William Templeton, Carthage; Mrs. E. D. Leavell, Westphalia, Kans.; Mrs. William Shoemaker, Kiesling, Wash.; and Wesley Harvey, Spokane, Wash. Besides these he is survived by 24 grandchildren and ten great grandchildren.

His true devoted companion was separated from him ten years ago. This sad occurrence in his life broke up his home, and took much of the pleasure out of life for him.

While still a young man he was converted and joined the Brethren Church. For 47 years he faithfully served his church as a christian minister. Much of his time, talent and money was spent for the cause he loved so much—God and hu-

manity. He ever lived and sought to inspire the good, the true and the beautiful things of life.

"Grandpa," as every one called him was a kind and loving father, a true friend and neighbor, a loyal citizen and an earnest, consecrated church worker.

His timely words of advice and counsel, his soul-comforting words to the broken-hearted, and his kind sympathizing disposition always appealed to all who came within his contact, and shall always be remembered by his children and grandchildren who deeply mourn his loss.

The funeral services were held at the Brethren Church at 10 o'clock, on Friday morning, June 23, 1916. Rev. Robert Bowman of Joplin conducted the services, assisted by Brother Earl M. Bowman, Jasper. The remains were quietly laid to rest in the family lot of the church cemetery.

The pall bearers were his grandsons: Orin, Earl and Will Harvey, Homer Wampler, Jerry Taylor and Gus Campbell.
