



REFUSES TO PLAY SUCKER

Charley Lilly and Homer Pitts Take Opposite Sides in Young Man's Game

Saturday evening about dark a young man about 23 years old, calling himself Babe Violette, accompanied by Mr. Maxwell who recently bought the Stark place, came into town and Violette secured an introduction to Mr. Lilly through Mr. Maxwell for whom he had been working. Violette claimed he wanted to buy an Overland from Mr. Lilly. After trying one but he decided it suited him and handed Mr. Lilly his check on a Joplin bank for the full amount, and wanted to take the machine right out as he wanted to use it Sunday, the next day.

That did not strike Lilly as a proposition, but he offered to go to the bank with the young man Sunday to try to see the cashier of the bank. Violette consented, but they failed to find the cashier or any of his assistants. On the return trip Violette made another effort to get the machine. He gave a reasonable excuse. He said that he and Maxwell wanted to go over to Maxwell's former home and get some more clothes, as they had not moved to the Stark farm yet. Mr. Maxwell, whom Mr. Lilly knew, agreed to stand up for the machine if he wanted to let them have it, and Mr. Lilly came near doing it as he had the young man's check for the price, but he finally said: "No, I'll drive you over myself."

HUGHES COMING OCTOBER 13

Presidential Candidate to Speak in Joplin.

Charles E. Hughes, Republican nominee for President of the United States, will speak in Joplin on Friday evening, October 13.

This is the information sent to Jasper county Republicans in a special message Monday. As the tour is planned now by the national committee, Governor Hughes will reach St. Louis about 6.30 a. m. on October 13 and will arrive in Springfield about 12.30 the same day, where he will remain till 2 o'clock and will reach Joplin at 5 o'clock that afternoon. He will make an evening address in Joplin, departing at midnight for Nebraska, where he is also booked for a series of speeches.

Plans for the Hughes meeting will be taken up at once by Joplin and Jasper county officials of the Republican organization. It is certain that a great crowd will be in Joplin to greet the presidential candidate.—Press.
