DEATH OF JUDGE TOM BROCK

Dies Suddenly Sunday Evening While Doing Cheres-56 Years Old.

Judge Thomas Brock, a former member of the Jasper county court, died suddenly at 5:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon at his home near Melugin. Death was caused by leakage of the heart He was in the barn at his home when suddenly stricken. He called his son, Roy, who was in the barn milking, but was unconscious when the son reached him. He died before he could be taken to the house.
