## Rev. J. W. Moore Visits Jasper.

Rev. J. W. Moore came up from Neosho last Friday to get his household goods, which he had taken to Carl Junction. Mr. Moore left here the last week in June, last year, to go to the big centenary meeting in Columbus, Ohio. On his way back he stopped in Chicago and went to a hospital for treatment for a kidney affection. After one day in the hospital he continued his trip toward home, but when St. Louis was reached he could go no further and was taken to Barnes Hospital, where he was operated on two or three times. He was discharged November 1st and went to his old home at Neosho. Before a week had passed he had to be taken back to Barnes Hospital, two more operations following. He finally arrived home to stay at Christmas time after 6 months of suffering such as seldom comes to a man in so short a time. He now seems to be on the road to final recovery, though too weak to be very active. At the death of Rev. Mr. Oswald, pastor of the Carl Junction M. E. Church, who was killed by a train a short while ago, Mr. Moore was appointed to that pastorate and has taken up the work. Mrs. Moore has been sick for six weeks past and their daughter Marguerite had influenza, but they are both better now. Their many friends here hope that good health will be their lot for a long time to come.

## Jasper County Holstein Cow Leads.

## DEATH OF JUDGE TOM BROCK

Dies Suddenly Sunday Evening While Doing Chores—56 Years Old.

Judge Thomas Brock, a former member of the Jasper county court, died suddenly at 5:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon at his home near Melugin. Death was caused by leakage of the heart. He was in the barn at his home when suddenly stricken. He called his son, Roy, who was in the barn milking, but was unconscious when the son reached him. He died before he could be taken to the house.

Mr. Brock was 56 years old. He was born in Jasper county, August 20, 1863, spending his lifetime here except for a few years that the family lived in Cedar county when he was a boy. He was reared on a farm near Prosperity.

For many years Mr. Brock lived in Carthage. He was a printer in the earlier days there at one time being foreman in the old Banner newspaper and print shop. He quit as a printer to become a blacksmith, and followed that trade in Carthage about 20 years, owning a shop on the present site of the Woods garage on West Third street during most of that time. Seventeen years ago largely because his heart was affected by the strenuous blacksmith work, Mr. Brock quit his trade and became a farmer. He lived in the Dewey neighborhood, southeast of Jasper, until last September, when, having sold his farm to Sheriff Oll Rogers, he moved to the farm where he died.

It was 12 years ago that Mr. Brock served as county judge from the eastern district for one term. He was a Democrat. During his residence in Carthage he was a prominent member of the I. O. O. F. lodge, at one time being head of that organization there.

His wife, the one son and a daughter survive; also two brothers and two sisters. Roy Brock, who lives at home, and Mrs. Ralph Berry, of the Carytown neighborhood, are the children. Perry Brock, also a former county judge and who lives east of Carthage, and James Brock, of Duenweg, are the brothers. Miss Dicea Brock, of Diamond, and Mrs. Lizzie Wescott of Jasper, are the sisters.

The funeral was conducted from the home at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning. Rev. S. G. Keys, of Peirce City, was in charge. Burial was in the Brethren cemetery.

Judge Brock was a man of high integrity, a progressive citizen, and the kind of a man who is always a benefit to the community in which he lives.
