The Board of Directors of the Farmer's Cooperative Elevator Company reemployed J. E. Hull as manager of the elevator at a meeting held last Saturday, and as a mark of approval of his services bought their manager a new hat. Mr. Hull is universally liked by the patrons of the elevators.

**Farmers Elevator to Increase Stock.**

The board of directors of the Farmers Cooperative Elevator Company has called a stockholders meeting for Saturday, May 29, to consider the matter of increasing the capital stock of the company from \$15,000 to at least \$25,000, and to change the constitution so that stockholders may own as many shares as they wish up to 25, instead of only 4 shares as now provided by the constitution. The elevator is a prosperous concern but at times finds itself cramped for sufficient capital to handle the grain and other business of the elevator in the most advantageous way.

To change the constitution requires a majority vote of the stockholders and the board hopes for a full attendance of the stockholders.

**What Barton Thinks of Her Roads.**

George Schreiner, who drove from Kansas City Thursday in his big car is considerably peeved about the road from here to Sheldon. Everybody who travels the Jefferson Highway, he says, is warned against Barton County. "You can make it all right from here to Sheldon," they tell the tourist up there, "but you'll never get through Barton County."

If the Lamar Chamber of Commerce wants to do something worth while it ought to get busy and see if it couldn't get the road graded from here up to Sheldon.—Lamar Democrat.



**The Special Road District Election.**

This is an opportunity for this section to take a good step forward on the roads question and a big vote is looked for.
