TWO NEW COURSES FOR HIGH SCHOOL

HOME ECONOMICS AND MUSIC MAKE ANOTHER TEACHER NECESSARY

The Addition of the New Subjects will Add New Attraction for Rural Students to Come Here—Expect Large Enrollment in Fall.

Miss Lorah Mote of Carthage has been elected to teach in the Jasper High School the coming year. One of Miss Mote's subjects will be home economics, one of the new courses added the Jasper school work. Miss Mote is a daughter of County Farm Agent Mote of Carthage. She has specialized in home economics and is well qualified to teach it.

Music has also been added to the Jasper High School course and Miss Esther Barnhart, also of Carthage, has been elected to teach the subject. While in Stevens College Miss Barnhart stood high in the musical activities of the college and was a member and officer in the college choral society.

These two subjects will add much prestige to the Jasper High School, and though the school has always been popular with rural students it is expected that a larger enrollment than ever will be had this fall.

The school directors should be congratulated upon this forward movement which is sure to prove popular with students and patrons of the Jasper High School.
