DURING the next few weeks it is quite probable that the unfair and unprincipled "Captains of industry" throughout the country—those fellows, who think it is smart to do all the robbing of the people possible and keep out of the penitentiary—will use their great financial and industrial power to defeat the nomination of Secretary Taft for President. They will perhaps increase the number of idle men by laying off all help possible on the railroads and in the factories they control and will give out interviews in which they will attempt to exaggerate the depressions and business conditions and by inference and innuendo try to discredit the Roosevelt administration. But our Democratic friends need not take any comfort to themselves on that account. It will not in any way aid them to elect Bryan. It is the "one best bet" that every business man of any consequence in the big industrial world, be he Democrat or Republican will work against and vote against Bryan. He is too well known to command much support from sane thinking people. This fight against administration ideas is directed against Secretary Taft because he is the representative of these ideas, and the purpose is to secure some one on the Republican ticket for President, who will be less friendly to the interests of the people, as a whole and more lenient to the "thieves in high places". Of course their fight is all against the Republican candidates, who have a chance of being nominated at Chicago, because they see plainly that the nominee of the Chicago convention will be the next President of the United States. The Republican party can be depended upon to defeat the Knoxes, Forakers and their like and select a candidate, who will represent the best interests of the people and of the Republic.

THE army appropriation bill has passed the house of representatives. It provides for the increase of pay of privates which has been advocated so warmly during recent months. The opinion seems to be general throughout the country that the money paid for service in the army is inadequate. The thinning ranks are partly accounted for in this way. The Senate has been working upon a bill of its own for fixing the pay of the army. The determination to increase the army pay having been shown both by the Senate and the House there should be no difficulty in arranging a combination of measures satisfactory to all concerned. There is no doubt that the country at large will approve the underlying idea, that officers and men of the army should have higher pay.

LAST week Tuesday another frightful holocaust occurred at Collinwood, Ohio. This time it was a school house inadequately provided with means of escape which formed the "fire-trap" in which over 160 young lives were claimed by the fire fiend. A few months ago a second floor opera house in a Pennsylvania town was the "trap" that held some over 170 souls until the flames swallowed them up. The proper

authorities in every town and city should take warning by what has happened and see to it that all halls and public places where large numbers assemble are provided with the best means of escape in case of fire or panic, that the conditions will permit. Unsafe halls and theaters should be closed.

THE provision in the army appropriation bill, now before Congress, to increase the pay of enlisted soldiers forty percent should pass. It is a shame and a disgrace to pay our soldier boys the miserable pittance they now receive. And farther the use of enlisted men as servants to petty officers and as day laborers at such degrading work as breaking stone should stop. Our boys enlist as soldiers and are willing and glad to do all of the soldier's duty, but they resent the humiliations heaped upon them by the commanding officers, and we believe these degrading tasks are the cause of more desertions than is the small pay. Treat our enlisted men like soldiers and they will do their full duty.

SUCH horrors as the dreadful calamity in the Cleveland suburb Tuesday should stimulate public officials everywhere to renewed activity in the enforcement of all reasonable regulations to prevent disaster from fire and panic. It is gratifying therefore to learn that the St. Louis Commissioner of buildings and the Missouri inspector of factories are awake to their responsibilities.

In nothing is it more literally true that eternal vigilance is the price of safety.

Of course their are spacious excuses for inaction but none of them explain or justify the trifling with human life.—St. Louis Republic.

THE saddest of all tragedies is that which sacrifices children. It has been the terrible misfortune of a school building at Collinwood the Cleveland suburb, to contribute one such. The community will have the sympathy of the country, but in its present bereavement will find it an unsubstantial solace. Authorities responsible for the safe keeping of the children will find their burdens heavy even if it be proven that the fatalities were in spite of precautions rather than because of the lack of them. Collinwood is in the shadow of a terrible grief. The sympathy of the country is boundless even if it is unavailing.—Chicago Tribune.
