St. Louis, Mo., June 23, 1908. Cattle receipts 3000. Only twenty loads of natives on sale and that including nothing choice, best being yearlings at \$7.00. Good grades sold actively at strong to a shade higher values; medium kinds steady. Last weeks big run and heavy decline in values has effectively cut off shipments for this week, and prices now show signs of some improvement, particularly for the good grades. We rather look for a strong market during the remainder of this week. Stockers and feeders steady. Veal calves strong.

Hog receipts 8500. Good kinds strong to 5c higher; others weak. Top \$6.20; bulk \$5.95 to \$6.15. Would not be surprised to see the hog market weaken a little by the end of this week. Sheep receipts 5000; spring lambs 15 to 25c higher. Top \$7.00. Clipped lambs and sheep strong with yesterday; top clipped lambs \$6.25, which was paid for choice Colorados. Good clipped yearlings and lambs mixed sold at \$5.85. Top native sheep \$5.00; most of the good ones \$4.50 to \$4.75. Outlook about steady this week.
