Cattle receipts 2500; market strong on all kinds. Top \$7.10 for two loads of thousand pound yearlings, which we sold. It looks now as though receipts of good corn fed cattle are apt to be light from this on, and we look for a good strong market on all good, corn fed steers and butcher stuff.

Hog receipts 6000; market 10 to 15 cents higher. Top \$6.10 with the bulk of the good hogs selling at \$5.75 to \$6.00. The bulk of the hogs coming in at present are very poor quality, and half fat and it looks as if hogs will sell better in the near future.

Sheep receipts 1200; market 25 cents higher. Bulk of the good lambs \$5.50 to \$5.75; bulk of the sheep \$4.25 to \$4.50.—National Live Stock Commission Co.


