Femmer "woke up" he telegraphed to Evansville, Ind., and learned that there was no such man as John Garrison known there, Garrison was the name the thief gave here. Mr. Femmer reported the case to Sheriff Geo. E. Earnest after the team had been gone nearly a week. The sheriff immediately got busy with the telephones and telegraph and postal cards and finally located the stolen horses at New Haven, Mo., a town west of St. Louis about forty-five miles from this city. Garrison sold the team to a farmer for \$100.00 and made his escape. Mr. Femmer went and brought back the team last Friday.

During the past two years a number of horses have been stolen from this and adjoining counties that have never been recovered. Some means should be provided to make it possible to capture and punish these scoundrels. As it is now there is no county fund with which one could pay the expenses of a pursuit, and unless the person who is robbed can and will pay such expenses the horse thieves have a pretty good chance to get away. There is no way under the law for the county Board to provide such fund. The only way that a vigorous pursuit of horse thieves can be provided for is by an organization of citizens into an Anti-horse thief association and make up the necessary fund by voluntary contributions. Something should be done.
