Hog receipts 5500; market opened strong to 10c higher, early top being \$8.55. The close, however, was very weak, prices showing a decline of 25 to 30c from early sales. Bulk of hog light hogs sold from \$8.20 to \$8.45; good heavies \$8 to \$8.20. Outlook weak. Sheep receipts 1500; the choice lambs 10c higher, top \$6.85. Other kinds steady. Sheep steady, bulk \$3.90 to \$4.15; outlook fair on the best sheep and lambs.
