


ALL ABOARD AT LAST.

The First Car Will be Run This Evening to the M., K. & T. General Offices.

Sedalia's Electric Road is an Enterprise of Which All Should be Proud.

Four Miles of Road Completed and Six Miles Inside of the Next Month.



'All aboard for the general offices!' Such will be the cry on Ohio street this afternoon, probably about 4:30 or 5 o'clock, when the first electric car will be run on that thoroughfare, its destination being the general offices of the M., K. & T.

This was decided by Superintendent

to Hancock, and north on Hancock to Fifth street, passing in front of the general offices of the M., K. & T.

This stretch completed, the workmen returned to Tenth and Ingram streets and the line was constructed south on Ingram to Thirteenth, west on Thirteenth to Ohio, and north on Ohio to the Missouri Pacific railway track, the present northern terminus.

Returning to Thirteenth and Ohio streets, the line was run south to Twenty-fourth street, to which point it is laid to-day. From Twenty-fourth street to Metcher park, on the Winzberg place, will be the next stretch completed, and cars will be running there inside of a week.

In addition to the territory covered as mentioned above, there is a line running west from Ohio street on Sixteenth to Montebau street, and it will be extended to J. R. Barrett's place before another month has rolled around, thus giving Sedalia very nearly six miles of electric railway.

The route west from Sixteenth and Montebau streets has not been decided upon yet, but it is quite likely the road will run west on Sixteenth street to Grand avenue, north on the latter street to Eleventh street, and west on Eleventh to its western terminus.

The above information was gleaned from Judge Metcher this morning. The road will not have any superior

STILL LIVES TO TELL IT.

The Terrible Wound Veteran John Nichols Received at Vicksburg.

John Nichols, a battle-scarred veteran from the Soldiers' home at Leavenworth, was in the city this morning on his return to the home from a visit to his sister in Sedalia. Nichols was a member of the Fifteenth regiment New York volunteers, and was in twenty-three battles of the war. He was with Grant at the siege of Vicksburg and there received a wound from a shell, his survival of which has been considered almost miraculous. The shell killed five other men who stood in the ranks with him. A large opening was torn from the right to the left across his body just below his breast. By great skill the surgeons covered his body with bandages and kept the inner parts from exposure, and in two years' time the wound had almost healed over, but still left an ugly trace of the shell. Mr. Nichols received five musket balls in his body at the same siege.—K. C. Star.

One year of English society put an end to Pocahontas. It is hardly in the mind of man to conceive more sudden or more startling changes of condition than these two wild Indian girls experienced.

A Curious Legend.

A singular and beautiful tradition lingers about the ruins of an old log church in the village of Goodluck, Ocean county, N. J.

In 1770 a brig named Hand-in-Hand struck on the bar near this point. Among the passengers rescued was an English clergyman named Murray, who having lost his wife and children, had become a prey to despair. Almost insane, he had resolved never to preach again, but to come to the wilderness of the New World where he could forget the past and the God who, he believed, had forgotten him.

As he crossed the sand beaches he saw a log house and near it an old man standing in the door of a cabin. A basket of fish was beside him.

"Will you sell me a fish?" asked the shipwrecked man.

"No. The fish are yours. I caught them for your dinner. I expected you."

"You do not know who I am," replied Mr. Murray.

"You are the man who is to tell us of God" said the old man.

"I will never preach of him again," was the answer.

The fisherman, Thomas Potter, told his story. He had been a sailor, but had settled with his wife, twenty years ago, on this coast. He could not read, but his wife spelled out some verses in the Bible.

"I determined," he said, "to know something about God. Whenever a preacher came from down the coast I would gather the folks into the kitchen to hear him preach. When I got a day to spare I worked at my log house. It is a church. I built it.

"First, a Presbyterian came along, and then a Baptist, and then a Methodist. They all preached in it, and I said: 'Stay, and teach us about God.' But no, they had work elsewhere.

Last night I saw the brig cast away on the sands. I heard a voice beside me, and it said: 'There, in that ship, is the man who will teach you of God. He has come through great sorrow to do this work.'

"I have made ready for you a long time ago," said the old man, with tears in his eyes. "You will not go away."

The legend is that this strange event brought the rebellious minister to his knees before God, and that he remained during the rest of his life at Goodluck preaching in the log church, faithful and happy in his work.

Thomas Potter bequeathed the church to him, and the will of John Murray, minister at Goodluck, still exists, in which he left it "free for the use of all Christian people."—Youth's Companion.

A Yankee Wonder.

When the new Herreshoff torpedo boat Cushing made twenty-two knots an hour on her trial trip, her performance was thought little less than marvelous. It the Cushing had been an English or French or German craft, that burst of speed would probably never have been repeated, for the excellent reason that it could not be on account of swift deterioration in hull, boilers and machinery. But things appear to be different in America, for the Cushing has now been some months in actual commission, and has been improving with use, rather than the opposite. One day recently the little craft ran over the measured mile on the Potomac river in one minute and fifty-six seconds, or at the rate of twenty-six knots an hour—the highest speed ever attained by a torpedo boat of any nation. The two remaining cuts show cars in motion, and surely they are enough to attract the attention of all.

A WICHITAN'S QUEER STORY.

For Two Years Out of His Mind—The Awakening in Colorado.

Wichita, Kan., July 2.—William Harrison, a leading groceryman here, who disappeared very suddenly two years ago and had not been heard from since, returned yesterday. The matter at the time created quite a sensation. The theories about financial and domestic trouble all proved to be untrue.

Harrison told his story last evening as follows: "I can only explain my absence on the theory of aberration of the mind. I remember leaving Sunday morning to spend the day with my uncle at Goddard. I don't remember leaving the team anywhere, nor do I remember boarding a train. I knew nothing until a few days ago, when I was working in a mine fifty miles west of Denver. I inquired

about where I was and they told me. I was informed that I was getting \$2 per day and board and that only a few dollars was due me. I told them my name and they said I had been going by the name of James Black. I told the proprietor my story and he looked at me in astonishment and at first seemed to doubt me. He finally loaned me enough money to get home and I am glad I found my wife and children alive and my business affairs all right."

Harrison lived here for eight years and was considered an exceptionally good business man, truthful and reliable.
