

A REIGN OF TERROR.

DYNAMITE EXPLOSIONS CAUSE AN EXODUS FROM PARIS.

VISITORS LEAVE THE CITY.

Anarchists Are Gloating Over the Effect of Their Fiendish Act—The People Are Living in Daily Fear of a Repetition of the Recent Explosions Discussed by the Cabinet—Stringent Measures.

PARIS, March 30.—It has been a long time since such activity has been shown by the police as is now displayed. The Rue Clichy explosion has impressed upon the authorities the fact that anarchists, or at least the crimes arising from that doctrine, must be prevented if the fair fame of the city is not to suffer.

The money loss growing out of the fear occasioned by the explosion is incalculable. With no certainty as to where the anarchists will strike their next blow, visitors to Paris deem it the safer plan to leave the city, much to the disgust of hotel proprietors and shopkeepers. There is no denying the fact that the expressed intention of anarchists to inaugurate a reign of terror has caused consternation.

An important meeting of the authorities was held at the ministry of the interior. The situation was discussed in all its bearings, and it was arranged to execute stringent measures for the prevention of further outrages. The residences of M. Athalin, an examining magistrate; M. Girard, the public analyst, and M. Clement, police commissary, are guarded day and night to prevent the anarchists from carrying out their threats to blow them up.

The Figaro publishes interviews with two leading anarchists. They declared that the members of the party were acting singly on their own responsibility and that there was no preconcerted plan to cause explosions. Both of them expressed themselves as delighted with the moral effect of the explosions, which they said would direct greater attention to their doctrine.

A Cabinet Council Held.

A cabinet council was held at which the ministers discussed the explosion that occurred Sunday morning at the house, 39 Rue Clichy, where great damage was done. At the close of the meeting M. Loubet, the prime minister, had a conference with M. Richard, minister of justice, and several magistrates and chiefs of police. M. Loubet communicated to them the government's decision regarding the adoption of measures to prevent any further work of destruction by the anarchists.

The announcement is again made that the police are again on the track of M. Ravochol, who they concede is the author of the St. Germain and Rue Clichy explosions.

It is reported that a woman, whose name is given as Mariett A. Soubert, has betrayed the Ravochol party to the police, who fear that the capture of Ravochol will be a desperate undertaking.

Baron Rothchild and other leading bankers and prominent residents of this city have received menacing letters from the anarchists.

In all the fashionable quarters precautions have been taken against explosives. Cellar gratings have been replaced by sheet iron shutters and front doors are kept closed. Servants employed by local judges and legal officials are quitting the service.

Bound for Oklahoma.

DENVER, Tex., March 30.—An exodus to the Cherokee strip and Oklahoma and this city has begun and by to-day 300 citizens will be bound thither in wagons and on foot. They are all of the better class, clerks, men of character and standing, and some professional men. They go to take advantage of the approaching opening of the new lands.

Spring Out the Land.

WARSAW, March 30.—The Official Journal reports that another balloon, manipulated by Germans, has been seen crossing over the frontier. The government, the Journal says, intends to protest against this action of the German military authorities as a breach of the military laws.

In Memory of General Sherman.

ALBANY, N. Y., March 30.—Over 3,000 persons listened to Chauncey M. Depew's oration on the occasion of the memorial services in honor of W. T. Sherman, under the auspices of the legislature of the state of New York which was held yesterday in Bleeker hall, this city.

General Dustin Dying.

CARTHAGE, Mo., March 30.—General Dustin, department commander of the Illinois G. A. R. and an old army comrade of President Harrison, is lying at death's door at the residence of his daughter here. He came here a week ago to secure rest and a change of scenery and air.

CROP PROSPECTS FAVORABLE.

Grain and Fruit in Excellent Condition in Kansas—A Large Yield Indicated.

TOPEKA, Kan., March 30.—The Kansas Farmer will publish to-morrow reports from every county in Kansas showing the condition of wheat, the progress of spring fruit and general condition of live stock. These reports show a remarkably favorable condition for the farmers. While the fall was unfavorable for seeding, a good winter has brought up the average so that the wheat yield will be much better than was anticipated. Thirty counties in the Southeast and Northeast, which show an average prospect of little more than half a wheat crop, have never had in recent years large areas of wheat and have never been depended upon for it. The acreage in these counties has been greatly reduced as compared with last year, and the present prospect is placed at 50 per cent. Twenty-nine central counties show an average wheat prospect of 75 per cent of the usual crop. Forty-three western counties show an increased prospect over the big crops of last year of from 10 to 20 per cent, which, with a continuation of favorable conditions, gives a prospect in the entire state of 85 per cent. No Hessian fly or other pest has been reported from any section and the small amount of wheat winter killed is confined to the Eastern counties. Owing to the unusual wet weather spring work has been greatly delayed and only about twenty per cent of the oats have been sown, which reduces the oats prospect, but will cause the largest acreage in corn the state has ever known, as an unusual amount of fall plowing was done in the Western counties.

Everything is reported favorable for all kinds of fruit, except peaches, which have not been so generally winter killed as was supposed. From all stations in the state the ground is reported soaked, which makes the condition for general farming favorable.

The reports covering live stock show that all kinds of stock are in good condition, March being the only severe month. A sufficient abundance of good rough feed to last until grass is reported throughout the state. Work animals are in extra average condition and no disease prevails.

An Early Morning Murder.

CHICAGO, March 29.—Arnold Janz, a paper carrier, was assassinated this morning before daylight when leaving home on his daily round. Martin Techel, a dissipated laborer, who boarded at Janz's house and unsuccessfully aspired to the hand of Janz's daughter, is under arrest charged with the shooting.

Will Leave a Surplus.

ATCHISON, Kan., March 29.—John C. Tomlinson, receiver of the People's Savings bank, which failed over a year ago, is out in a card in the local papers in which he says that there is money enough on hand to pay all depositors in full and that a surplus of \$25,000 will be left.

Greer Confident of Nomination.

TOPEKA, Kan., March 29.—Ed P. Greer of Winfield candidate for Republican nomination for congressman at large, is in the city to-day. Mr. Greer is confident of success. His only opponent is ex-Attorney General Bradford who has not made much of a canvass.

Price of White Lead to Be Increased.

CINCINNATI, O., March 29.—James L. McBirney, J. S. Stevens and George Muel of New York, who are prominent in the national white lead trust, arrived here last evening. It is probable that a slight increase in the price of white lead will be ordered.

Declared for Hill.

ATLANTA, Ga., March 29.—The Democratic convention of Polk county for the election of delegates to the state convention which is to elect delegates to the National convention chose delegates friendly to the election of Hill as president.

"Bless You, My Children."

SAN FRANCISCO, March 29.—George and Anita Baldwin returned to this city to-day. It is rumored that Lucky Baldwin has forgiven the runaway pair and that George is soon to be put in charge of the Baldwin hotel.

Shot and Killed While Preaching.

AUGUSTA, Ga., March 29.—Bishop Jones, a noted colored minister, while preaching at Allendale Thursday last, was shot, the assassin, who fired through the window, escaping. Jones was of the "Holiness" faith.

BENDERS OUTDONE.

WHOLESALE ASSASSINATION BY TWO RUSSIAN BROTHERS.

THEY KILL OVER FORTY PEOPLE.

A Reign of Terror in Paris—The City All Tore Up Over the Continued Dynamite Explosions—The Coroner's Jury in the Liverpool Deening Case Censure the Police for Neglect of Duty.

WARSAW, March 29.—Police inquiries into the case of two brothers Koulikovsky, who are imprisoned here on the charge of murdering and robbing a peasant near Bielostock, have revealed the practice of the wholesale murder of emigrants on the frontier. Already the naked bodies of five victims have been discovered in the snow in the woods adjacent to the house occupied by the Koulikovskys, who live in the village of Monki. The search of bodies is proceeding.

There have been many disappearances of late in the neighborhood of the Koulikovsky residence and the police estimate that the two brothers have murdered at least forty people. At the outset, the brothers carefully burned the bodies, but as time went by, they, being undetected, became careless and shoved the bodies under the brushwood after stripping them.

THE POLICE CRITICIZED.

Verdict of the Coroner's Jury in the Liverpool Horror.

LIVERPOOL, March 29.—The coroner's jury investigating into the deaths of the woman and four children whose bodies were found buried under the floor of Dinham villa, at Rain Hill, continued its investigation yesterday. Among the witnesses who testified was Beatha Deening, a sister of the murdered woman, who is the wife of Albert Deening, a brother of the murderer.

The jury returned a verdict of willful murder against Deening. In their verdict they severely criticized the action of the Rain Hill police, who, although everybody was suspicious of Deening, took no action against him.

MELBOURNE, Australia, March 29.—It has been arranged that the landing of Deening here on his arrival from Albany, Western Australia, shall be secret in order to foil attempts that may be made to lynch the murderer.

REIGN OF TERROR.

The Dynamite Explosions in Paris Have Prefaced a Panic.

PARIS, March 29.—The excitement caused by the explosion at the residence of M. Bulot, at 30 Rue Clichy, has in no way abated. Some persons say that the time is rapidly approaching when the people will depend no longer upon the police for protection, but will take the law into their own hands and rid the city of anarchists by hanging them to the most convenient tree or pole that presents itself.

Stringent orders have been given to the chief of police to take into custody anyone whose actions or language show that they are in sympathy with the men who delight in calling themselves terrorists. It is the general opinion that instead of exciting terror the anarchists will arouse such a wave of indignation that they will be themselves the greatest sufferers.

LYNCHERS ON TRIAL.

Four of the Taney County Lynchers Under Examination.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., March 29.—The preliminary examination of Captain Madison Day, an old citizen and corner of Taney county; George L. Taylor, a lawyer, Charles Stogstell and Enos Isaacs, both farmers, for the murder of Deputy Sheriff Williams began yesterday. They were all formerly members of the Bald Knobber's organization that inaugurated such a reign of terror in Taney county some time ago. Their examination will probably take up the entire week. The door of the jail remains open since the night it was battered down by the lynchers and an old sow with a litter of pigs are unmolested occupants thereof. It is said to be the same sow that ate off a portion of John Bright's face while he lay in the open court house the night he was lynched.
