At this day comes the plaintiff herein, by her attorney, before the undersigned Clerk of the Circuit Court of Barry County, Missouri, in vacation, and file her petition and affidavit, alleging among other things that Defendant, David M. Bingham is a non-resident of the State of Missouri, so that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him in this state as provided in Chapter 8, R. S., 1899.

Whereupon, it is ordered by the clerk in vacation that said defendant be notified by publication that plaintiff has commenced a suit against him in this court, the object and general nature of which is to dissolve the bonds of matrimony contracted between plaintiff and defendant and obtain a divorce, and that unless the said David M. Bingham be and appear at this court, at the next term thereof, to be begun and holden at the court house, in the City of Cassville, in said County, on the 8th day of February next, and on or before the first day of said term, unless further time be given by the court, answer to the petition in said cause, the same will be taken as confessed and judgment will be rendered accordingly.

And it is further ordered, that a copy hereof be published, according to law, in the Monett Times, a weekly newspaper published in Barry County, Missouri.
