## HOPKINS FAILS RE-ELECTION.

**When Both Houses Adjourn There Is No Evidence of Breaking of Deadlock.**

Springfield, Ill., Jan., 21.—Seven more joint ballots for United States senator were taken by the Illinois general assembly today and nothing indicating a break in the existing deadlock could be seen. Twelve ballots now have been taken, and Senator Albert J. Hopkins is no nearer re-election than before. After their vain efforts of today the legislators adjourned until next Tuesday, when they will take another ballot.

This is the way the legislators were lined up at the conclusion of the twelfth ballot: Hopkins, 83; Congressman Foss, 16; Lawrence B. Stringer, democratic candidate, 56; Speaker Shurtliff, 14; Mason, 4; McKinley, 1; Lowden, 1; Browne, 16; Cahoun, 2; Quinn, 1.
