## APACHE CHIEF BURIED

### Funeral of Indian Delayed Until Children Arrive—Whites First View Body.

Lawton, Okla., Feb. 18.—Shortly after 4 o'clock this afternoon in the little Indian cemetery near Fort Sill, with the rites of Christian burial, Geronimo, the Apache war chief, was quietly laid to rest. The funeral was postponed an hour until the arrival of his two children, Eva and Robert, from the Chillico school. The procession of whites, soldiers and Apaches was more than a mile long.

The whites first and then the Indians were allowed to view the body, and the other members of the tribe, especially the women, were grief-stricken. Rev. I. I. Leglers, the missionary who conducted the funeral, told through an interpreter the story of the five wise and the five foolish virgins.

The old chief's wife was prevented from killing his favorite horse, in accordance with the Indian custom, but relatives placed in his grave his riding whip and blankets.
