ROOSEVELT MENACE

SO PEACE, HE SAYS.

Cook, of Colorado, Makes Most Vicious Attack House Ever Heard.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Representative Geo. W. Cook, of Colorado, Republican, in the House today, made the most vicious attack on President Roosevelt and his administration probably ever made in or out of Congress. He bitterly assailed the President for his attitude towards citizens of Colorado, charged with violations of law, and accused the President of vetoing the bill recently passed by Congress, fixing the Colorado-New Mexico boundary line, at the instigation of a Colorado corporation, which sought to avoid payment of taxes on thousands of acres of coal lands.

He charged that Roosevelt had sent a notorious horse thief as a Secret Service agent to accompany Special Land Agent Walker, who was killed in Colorado, in 1907, while investigating land frauds. He assailed the President for interference with the courts with the object of upsetting the decision of Judge Lewis in the Colorado lumber fraud cases.

Frisco Loses Big Damage Suit

Attorney F. P. Sizer has the distinction of winning for his client, Mrs. Alta Lee, the biggest judgment for damages that has probably ever been rendered by a jury of Barry County for personal injuries. Mrs. Lee brought suit in January against the Frisco Railroad Company for injuries sustained by falling through the depot platform at Fitzhugh, Okla., on the 12th day of last July, by reason of a rotten plank breaking. She had just alighted from the train and had a small child in her arms when she fell, and received injuries to spine and other parts of the body. For two days the case was bitterly contested in the circuit court at Cassville, and last night the jury brought in a verdict of twelve thousand dollars for the plaintiff. Mrs. Lee was represented by Attorney F. P. Sizer of Monett, and the Frisco was represented by T. J. Woodruff and J. B. Todd of Springfield, T. D. Steele of Monett and J. S. Davis of Cassville. General Claim Agent Edgar assisted the attorneys for the Railroad. Dr. Jones of Monett testified as an expert for plaintiff and Dr. Hawkins, Division Surgeon, testified as expert for the Frisco.
