This is said to be the largest yield ever known in Missouri.

FRUIT GROWERS

MEETING

WILL MEET IN MONETT SEPTEMBER 13 AND 14 IN QUARTERLY SESSION

The quarterly meeting of the Ozark Fruit Growers' association will be held in Monett, September 13 and 14 for the transaction of any business that may come before the association. An interesting program has been prepared and a large attendance is expected. The sessions will begin at 9:30 a. m.

G. W. Logan, a widely known horticulturist of Logan, will read a paper on "Strawberry Culture." The "Record of Cars Shipped" will be discussed by W. D. Cowherd, of Butterfield, R. F. George of Peirce City has consented to prepare and read a paper on "Inspection." "What should be the Work of the Ozark Fruit Growers' Association?" will be the subject of a paper by S. B. Keagy of Diamond.

Other papers to be read and discussed will be on "What Would be the Result of Berry Growing Without Co-operation?" by George Hatzfield of Neosho, one by W. L. Howard, a member of the state board of horticulture; and "Co-operation," by P. A. Rodgers of Gravette, Ark. Mr. Rodgers is now in the New England states in the interest of organization work and is meeting with success, the work of the Ozark association being much discussed there.

Following is a resume of the work done by the association during the season just closed in the Ozarks:

Headquarters were maintained in the strawberry season at Monett, Missouri, with sub-headquarters at Neosho, Associations signing the contracts, 25. Associations shipping, 24. Number of cars of strawberries shipped by Missouri associations was 376 and by the Arkansas associations 21; a total of 397. Total number of crates shipped, 205, 259 7-12. Total amount received for strawberries marketed by the Ozark Fruit Growers' association this season, was \$306,898.13. Average price received per crate, \$1.93. Average price paid to association \$1.89. First car shipped April 29, 1909. Last car shipped June 17, 1909.
