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## NEGRO LYNCHED BY MOB

After Lynching the Negro the Body Was Burned. Assault on White Girl

A mob of 10,000 frenzied citizens, men and women lynched William James, the negro accused of the brutal murder of Miss Anna Pelley, at Cairo, Ill., last night. He was hanged from an arch in a conspicuous part of the city.

The negro was found by the sheriff in a swamp some distance from Cairo, but a crowd took the negro from the officers and brought him to Cairo, where, after he had made a confession which also implicated another negro, he was lynched and hundreds of bullets were fired into the body as it dangled in the air. The body was then cut down and burned on the spot where the crime was committed.

The Sheriff was unable to sustain order and telephoned to the governor for a detachment of state troops.

## RECEIVES PATENT FOR CONCRETE CROSS TIE AT SPRINGFIELD

A. O. Coffin, an employe in the maintenance department of the Frisco, at Springfield has received notice of the granting of a patent to him on a concrete railroad cross tie.

The superior merit claimed for the invention consists in the device for fastening the rail to tie, which is done by means of a spike with ball at end inserted in a tie, a device which distinguishes the invention from everything in this line heretofore invented, in which bolts have been relied upon as a means for making the connection of rail and tie.

## ARREST SENECA GIRL FOR REALTY DEALER'S MURDER

Oklahoma City, Ok., Nov. 11.—Detective Webb Jones left today for Seneca, Mo., to bring back Maude Geck, for whom a warrant was issued today charging her with the murder of R. D. Gannon a realty dealer, whose body was found on the top of a ten-story building here Sunday afternoon.

The warrant was sworn to by J. A. Stimmel, state deputy of the Knights of Columbus, who in an interview said he did not charge that Miss Geck was on the building at the time the murder was committed but that she was an accomplice. He asserts he has other knowledge of the affair that he refuses to reveal.
