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## Early Hearing In McQuary Suit

Springfield Dec. 22.—The supreme court has advanced the appealed case of J. H. McQuary against the Missouri Land Company, limited, of Scotland, for hearing in April. The case was certified to the higher court from Green county, where it was heard by Judge Neville in Division 1 of circuit court last winter.

By Judge Neville's decision, Mr. McQuary was granted the right to purchase 71,000 acres of Barry county land from the defendant company. The land company appealed, through its chief counsel, Attorney T. D. Steele, of Monett. Mr. McQuary is represented by Attorneys T. L. Montgomery, of Kahoka; Attorney E. P. Mann, of Springfield, and by Judge C. H. Skinker before he was appointed to the bench.

East and west bound Frisco passenger trains were all late Wednesday morning. The delay was caused at midnight near Newburg. The tire on the front driver of engine 228 broke, while train No. 14 in charge of Conductor Headley and Engineer Malamphy, was moving thirty miles an hour. No person was injured. The steam wrecker from Newburg cleared the main line about an hour after the relief outfit arrived.

Four freight cars of Frisco train No. 33, in charge of Conductor Foster and engineers Monroe and Brown, while pulling into the switch at Republic Tuesday night, were derailed on account of a broken rail. No person was injured.—Springfield Leader.

## McLaurin of Mississippi Succumbs to Heart Failure

Jackson, Miss., Dec. 22.—United States Senator McLaurin died suddenly at his home at Brandon at 7 o'clock tonight.

Death was due to an attack of heart failure and came with the slightest warning. When the fatal stroke came upon him Senator McLaurin was seated in a rocking chair in front of the fire in his library. He suddenly fell forward without speaking a word, and life was extinct when members of his family reached his side.

The swift summons of death followed within a few moments a remark by Senator McLaurin that he was then feeling better than he had felt at any time since his recent severe illness, resulting from an attack of ptomaine poisoning.

No announcement as to the funeral arrangements had been made at a late hour tonight.
