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MAJOR TO TAKE ACTION

Missouri Attorney General
Would Oust Packers

Jefferson City, March 17.—Attorney General Major will institute quo warranto proceedings against the packing companies of this state to oust and fine them for violations of the anti-trust laws of the state as soon as the hearings now under way are ended.

Only two more hearings will be held, one at St. Louis in the early part of April and one later in Jefferson City.

"I have already enough information against them," he said, "and I do not see the necessity of prolonging the inquiry. I believe there will be only two more hearings held, one at St. Louis where Campbell Cummings has obtained valuable information and the other one at Jefferson City."

Mr. Major, at the conclusion of the Jefferson City hearing, declared himself well satisfied with the testimony given, and when this evidence is strengthened by the St. Louis evidence he believes he will have enough information of an unlawful combination to immediately institute ouster suits.

WHEAT MARKET IN STEADY RISE

Recurrence of Crop Damage
Reports Gives Encouragement to Bullish Markets

Chicago, Ill., March 17.—Crop damage reports early in the day and the absence of moisture throughout the southwestern wheat belt gave encouragement to the bulls in the wheat pit and all the futures made material gains, the more distant options outstripping the May delivery. The closes were July \$1.07; September \$1.04 3/8 to \$1.04 1/2; May, \$1.12 3/8 to \$1.12 1/2.

Corn prices showed a gentle advance at the start, which under an abundance of offerings, changed quickly to a decided drop in the quotations.

The close was weak with all futures in May 3/4c off at 63 1/2c. Provisions were strong. Pork was up 15 cents at \$25.70.

MOTOR CAR LINE FOR MONETT

If Built Will Mean Much for
the Future of Our City

F. C. Yentsch of Mt. Vernon, is in the city today talking over with our people the proposed interurban motor car line between Springfield and Carthage.

It was first proposed to run the line from Mt. Vernon west through Stotts City but it is now thought advisable by the promoters of the proposed line to come through Monett.

The route as now contemplated will run west from Springfield to Paris Springs in Lawrence county and to Mt. Vernon, thence southwest to Hoberg, Froistatt and Monett, then in a west and northwesterly course through Police City, Wentworth and Sarcosie to Carthage.

The line as now planned will pass through a populous farming country and will be in many places at some distance from the other railways.

Mr. Yentsch informs us that he is receiving great encouragement all along the line and at least nine tenths of the farmers are giving the right of way and many in addition are subscribing for stock in the road. He has
