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## MARK TWAIN DIES; THE END IS PEACEFUL

Samuel Langhorne Clemens, Premier American Humorist and Raconteur, Enters Eternity

Redding, Conn., April 21.—Samuel Langhorne Clemens ("Mark Twain") died painlessly at 6:30 o'clock tonight of angina pectoris. He lapsed into coma at 3 o'clock this afternoon and never recovered consciousness. It was the end of a man outworn by grief and acute agony of body.

Yesterday was a bad day for the little knot of anxious watchers at the bedside. For long hours the gray, acquiline features lay moulded in the inertia of death, while the pulse sank steadily, but late at night Mark Twain passed stupor into the first natural sleep he had known since he returned from Bermuda and this morning he woke refreshed, even faintly cheerful, and in full possession of all his faculties.

He recognized his daughter, Clara, Mrs. Ossip Gabrilowitsch, spoke a rational word or two, and, feeling himself unequal to conversation, wrote out in pencil: "Give me my glasses." They were his last words. Laying them aside he sank first into reverie and, later, into final unconsciousness.

## MISSOURI FRUIT LITTLE HURT

Only That in Northern Counties Destroyed by Frost

Columbia, Mo., April 20.—According to George Reeder of the United States Weather Bureau at Columbia, little damage resulted to the fruit from the frost of last night.

In the Ozark region, the principal fruit section, 30 degrees was registered. The cold and cloudy weather of the last four days had in a measure prepared the fruit for last night's cold and rendered it immune.

W. L. Howard, secretary of the State Board of Horticulture, said that with the exception of the two northern tiers of counties, fruit in Missouri is practically uninjured. The fruit in the northern counties was destroyed by the frost of last Monday night.

The oil stoves in the University orchards were lighted for the first time last night. Students are experimenting with three kinds of stoves, and as many kinds of oil.

## INTERNATIONAL TRAINS

Frisco Establishes Service from St. Louis to Mexico City

The Frisco will inaugurate limited train service some time in July from St. Louis, Chicago and New Orleans to the City of Mexico, opening a new international route. Announcement of the plan was made by B. F. Yoakum last night prior to his departure for New York City, after an extended trip through the Southwest.

The service from St. Louis and Chicago will be provided over the company's main line to Houston and from Houston over the St. Louis, Brownsville & Mexico, which recently was absorbed by the Frisco, to Brownsville, and from Brownsville over the tracks of the National Railways of Mexico, via San Miguel, Monterey and San Luis Potosi, to the capital of the Diaz Republic.

### Necessity for Dental Education

Never until now has there been any general attempt made to prevent decay and disease of the teeth. Forty thousand dentists in the country are kept busy making repairs on teeth in which decay has not been prevented or in making substitutes for those that have been lost through neglect. This is all done for the comparatively few who are able and willing to pay the fees. These few practice cleanliness and try to follow the advice that is given so that they may save their teeth. The great mass of the people have no instruction and do not even try to keep their teeth clean.

The teeth lie at the gateway of the alimentary canal, and their use or abuse makes the first step in digestion. A wrong step causes vicious and unendurable damage.

The fact that uncivilized men have usually good teeth fastens the responsibility on civilized man, and there something wrong with his methods or his food. He eats without proper chewing. He tries to avoid the trouble of chewing his food by having it made ready for him in pulverized form or in liquids. He eats too fast, and through hurried and incomplete mastication he reduces his general health and his efficiency. Individual efficiency is the foundation stone upon which the national efficiency and progress must rest. It is therefore from the economic view of the whole people that dental education of the whole people demands first consideration.
