12 INJURED IN FRISCO WRECK AT FT. SMITH

Passenger Train and Switch Engine Collide With Disastrous Results

Ft. Smith, Ark., Jan. 11.—Fog, combined with a misting rain and the steam exhaust of an oil mill near the main line of the Frisco a mile east of Ft. Smith at 12:45 o'clock today, was the cause of a serious wreck when the "Slicker," the fast train from Van Buren, backed into an engine from the roundhouse, demolishing the rear coach of the passenger and injuring a dozen people, some seriously. The passenger train was in charge of Conductor D. F. Singleton, who was dangerously hurt about the back and legs, and G. W. Daniels, who was uninjured.

The roundhouse engine was in charge of Pilot Joe Tustison and Engineer W. T. Harlan. The passenger train, according to reports, was making a speed of only 12 miles an hour and the pilot engine was proceeding slowly at probably 5 miles an hour.


