The Katy Violated Federal Labor Law

Jefferson City, March 20.—Fines aggregating \$1,300 were adjudged against the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railroad company in the federal circuit court here today by Judge Van Valkenburg, for violations of the federal 16-hour continuous labor law. There were three cases. At a former term of court the company filed demurrers, but these were withdrawn today and the fines entered as stated.
