Mrs. Carpenter's letters written from Alaska were much enjoyed by our readers and these new letters will be read with equal interest. The first letter follows:

San Francisco, Feb. 4, 1913.

We went down to the wharf and saw the Cleveland. She is a monster and we can go on board today if we wish. but do not think we will. We will see enough of her and I have been on a good many big ships.

Wednesday morning.

We have been busy every moment since we came. Last night we went over to the Berkeley and spent the evening with some friends we met up North. We have to get our dinner on shore tonight. We will attend a reception on the ship this evening.

On board the Cleveland 5 p. m.

There is a crowd and public reception going on. We have just come from the dining room. Such an array of good and pretty eatables I never saw. Everything is German. Our steward can talk English but some cannot. We will all talk dutch before this trip is over. Everything is gorgeous—gold and lovely wood of all kinds, beautiful hangings and curtains. There are two dining rooms and all the people are seated at once.

The ship is to be illuminated this evening and a dance on board. We have steamer rugs and chairs and will spend a good deal of time on deck for we cannot see out from our stateroom, nor many of them in fact, but in case of a storm we are better off than on the top decks.


