80,000 TO STRIKE IF RAILWAYS HOLD TO PRESENT PLAN

Employees' Representatives Declare Roads' Grievances Must Be Considered Separately

New York, July 17.—The 80,000 trainmen who threaten to strike will not agree under any circumstances to have the roads' grievances arbitrated at the same time the men's demand for better wages under the new amendment to the Erdman act, according to a statement made tonight by William G. I. and A. B. Garetson, president respectively of the trainmen and conductors brotherhoods.

Lee in a verbal statement supplementing the former one said if the railroads persist in their present plans to have their matter arbitrated at the same time with the trainmen's, it is practically certain there will be a strike.

PAPERS PREDICT RECOGNITION

El Pais, Attacking Wilson, Says Mexicans Are Not Afraid

Mexico City, Mex., July 17.—All the newspapers here, having been cautioned by a Government official to treat the trip of Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson to Washington carefully and conservatively, confine themselves today to local stories and speculation that his going probably means early recognition of the Huerta administration by the United States.

They profess to believe that a successor to Mr. Wilson will be named immediately and in this way recognition will be achieved.

El Pais is the only newspaper to display bitterness. It confines itself chiefly to attacking Ambassador Wilson and characterizing him as an enemy of the Mexican Government. It ridicules the idea of war, saying that Mexicans no longer are afraid.

As indicating the brighter prospect, a Cabinet official gave out for publication the statement that Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood had been ordered to the border personally to see to the maintenance of the neutrality laws.

APPLE PROSPECTS SEEM POOR

From information gathered by the K. C. Packer, the apple prospects for southern Missouri and northern Arkansas this season are not very glowing. In the sprayed orchards, which are in the minority, prospects are much more favorable than those which have not received any care. The writer inspected orchards all over this territory and found conditions irregular. The Ben Davis variety, which comprises considerably over 50 per cent—some say 75 per cent—of the apples grown in this territory will be very short. In the unsprayed orchards there will only be from 15 to 30 per cent of a crop. In the sprayed orchards conditions are much better. In fact, the writer saw many well cultivated Ben Davis orchards which will produce practically a full crop, but the acreage of these is so small that it will not cut much figure in the crop as a whole. Jonathans, Maiden Blush, Grimes Golden and other varieties have been hurt very badly by fire blight. Jonathans will be exceedingly short. This blight prevails generally in both sprayed and unsprayed orchards, but is more severe in the unsprayed orchards. Winesaps, Ganos and Willow Twigs are showing up better than the other varieties.—Rogers Democrat.
