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VOTE FOR GOOD ROADS TOMORROW

Forest Park Almost Unanimous In Favor of Consolidation With Monett District

A number of good roads boosters of Monett went to the Bellview school house northeast of town last night to attend a meeting called for the purpose of discussing the annexation of Forest Park road district with the Monett Special Road District.

The house was filled with voters and the sentiment in favor of annexation was almost unanimous.

Resolutions were adopted favoring the proposed annexation and the voters of Monett were earnestly solicited to do all in their power Saturday to bring about a favorable result.

This consolidation will be of great benefit to Monett for the reason that a portion of the funds of the Special road district can then be used in the building of roads leading from the north into the city. Under the present conditions the only method of improving these roads is by private subscription.

All the voters of Monett should turn out tomorrow and vote in favor of the consolidation.

FRISCO CONTRACTS FOR TRAIN SHEDS TO COST \$62,000

Shelter, 715 Feet Long, Covering Four Tracks, Planned

Contracts for the erection of extensive train sheds and improvements in the railway yards east of the new Frisco office and station building, Sixth street and Virginia avenue, were awarded in St. Louis yesterday afternoon, according to Alexander Hilton of St. Louis, general passenger agent of the Frisco railway system, who visited Joplin yesterday.

The improvements will consist of a large "midway" train shelter for passengers, 110 feet wide and extending east from the east side of the new station a distance of ninety feet. It will extend the entire width of the station and office building and will be constructed entirely of concrete and steel.

Another train shed 625 feet long and about 45 feet wide will extend eastward from the midway shelter. It will cover each of the four main tracks and will be long enough to cover any length passenger train operated over the Frisco system, it is said.

"I am confident that the Frisco passenger station in the new building will be ready for occupancy within thirty days," said Mr. Hilton yesterday, in speaking of the new eight-story edifice recently erected by the Frisco at a cost of approximately one million dollars.

TO PASS TARIFF BILL TOMORROW

Democratic Senators Now Rushing to Pass Measure Before Adjournment Saturday

Washington, Sept. 4.—Democratic leaders of the senate will begin supreme efforts tomorrow to complete the tariff and pass it before adjournment Saturday night. As a part of the program the senate tonight adjourned until two o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

A compromise on the income tax rate representing its further concession to the insurgents, and advocating an increase on large incomes, has been drafted by Senators Williams and Simmons, and it is believed that it will be adopted without much opposition at a caucus tomorrow morning.

It proposed to increase the income tax rate on incomes of \$75,000 to \$100,000 from two to three per cent and on those ranging from \$100,000 to half a million, three to four per cent.

MRS. STRIBLING DEAD

Mrs. Stribling died Thursday, September 4, 1913, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Farris, three miles north of Monett, her death being due to old age. Mrs. Stribling was born in the year 1812, and at the time of her death was 101 years, 3 months and 11 days old.

Funeral services were held at the home Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Luther Carlin. Interment was made in the Dry Valley cemetery.
