Our ratings are not made as to the financial responsibility of a party, but as to the way he has paid his bills in the past.

A collection department will be operated in connection with the above association and ratings in the future will be made by consulting our records of his past and the attention given collection that come to the office of the secretary and manager.

These associations are organized all over the country and parties moving from one place to another will find them a great help in establishing their credit in a new town.

Very often their rating gets to the town before they do.

Another object of this association is to ascertain, if possible, parties who contemplate leaving the community without first settling their bills.

Parties who have been meeting their obligations will find this association a benefit to them while those who have been trying to evade them will find it an obstacle.
