FREIGHT RATE INCREASE IS GRANTED

Interstate Commerce Commission Grants Five Per Cent Increase to Certain Railways

In a divided opinion today, the interstate commerce commission granted some of the 5 per cent freight rate increases asked for by the eastern railroads and denied others.

Increases will apply in the territory north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers and from a vertical line drawn through Buffalo and Pittsburgh west as far as the Mississippi river. All class rates and many commodity rates are increased 5 per cent in that action.

No advances whatever were permitted east from Buffalo and Pittsburgh to the Atlantic seaboard. That includes the greatest traffic producing centers in the country.

Commissioners Daniels and McChord dissented from the majority opinion. Mr. McDaniel held that a 5 per cent increase should have been general—that the railroads were entitled to it to meet the high cost of living. Mr. McChord held that the reasons which the majority held to warrant an increase west of Pittsburgh applied equally to the territory east.

The majority, headed by Chairman Harlan, held that rates west of Pittsburgh were the lowest in the country and warrants an increase. While it was held that the income of the eastern railroads was smaller than demanded in public interest, no showing had been made warranting a general increase.

CARTHAGE AGENT HELD UP

Missouri Pacific Depot Robbed of \$139 Early Yesterday

Carthage, Mo., Aug. 3.—W. W. Dowling, night ticket agent, was held up and the Missouri Pacific depot here robbed of \$139 at 2:30 o'clock Saturday morning by a lone highwayman, who was masked.

Dowling was sitting at his desk writing when the highwayman accosted him and forced him to lie on the floor at the point of a revolver. The money drawer and safe were opened and \$139 and a check for \$90.40 were taken. Then the ticket agent was forced to walk down the tracks and enter a box car. The highwayman locked the door and admonished Dowling not to make any noise. After waiting about half an hour, Dowling crawled out of a hole at the end of the car and returned to the station.

The Missouri Pacific depot is about one mile west of the square. No traces of the highwayman has been found and no arrests have been made.

SUES FRISCO FOR \$35,000

Edgar Hedrick, of St. Louis, through his attorney D. H. Kemp, filed suit in the Circuit Court of St. Louis yesterday against the Terminal Railroad Association of St. Louis for \$35,000 damages.

Mr. Hedrick was a switchman and while performing his duties as such in the yards in East St. Louis, his foot was caught in an unblocked "frog" and before he could get loose the oncoming car caught him and ran over his right leg crushing the bones and mangling his leg so that it became necessary to amputate it above the knee.

Mr. Hedrick through a friend of Mr. Kemp's wrote him, and failing to get a settlement for the injuries Mr. Hedrick received, Attorney Kemp filed suit, and the case will be tried in St. Louis this fall.

GOOD ORE PROSPECTS

The Blakeslee Mining Company of Monett have now a thirteen foot face of fine jack in their shaft near Butterfield and will begin drifting at once. There have been sunk mine drill holes on the property near the shaft and ore was struck in each of them.

NO WOLF AT MISSOURI'S DOOR

Balance of More Than 7 Million Dollars at Close of the Month

Jefferson City, July 31.—There was a balance in the state treasury at the close of business this evening of \$7,172,209.88. The balance at the close of business June 30 was \$7,109,828.29. For the month the receipts amounted to \$1,164,961.50 and the disbursements foot up \$1,102,579.91. There is a balance in the revenue fund of \$424,339.55 and a balance to the credit of the public schools of \$1,933,449.45.

The various good road funds have a balance of \$225,948.52. This was contributed to from the following sources: Motor car licenses, \$97,601.55; sale of option stamps, \$31,554.28; general road fund, \$66,552.46; corporation tax, \$40,276.23.

For the month the earnings of the penitentiary amounted to \$33,244.43. There are \$2,398,826.16 in the capitol building fund and \$270,365.83 in the capitol tax fund.
