MUCH DAMAGE TO CORN

Washington, Aug. 7.—Dry, hot weather in July cut 283 million bushels from the corn crop prospect, and impairment by black rust and other causes reduced the spring wheat prospect 38 million bushels, according to the August crop report of the Agricultural Department, issued at 2:15 o'clock this afternoon. The winter wheat estimate is 22 million bushels larger than in July, and 152 million bushels more than the crop of 1913.
