DROP BOMBS IN TSING TAO

The Japanese Have Occupied Railway Station at Kiao Chow

Tokio, Sept. 16.—It is officially announced that a Japanese aeroplane dropped bombs on the barracks of the Germans at Tsing Tao and that the machine returned safely to its headquarters.

The destroyer flotilla operating from Laoshan Bay, near Tsing Tao, drove in the enemy's patrols.

The railway station at Kiao Chow, five miles from the bay of that name and opposite Tsing Tao, the German fortified port, was occupied September 13 by Japanese scouts, according to an official announcement made today.

Springfield, Sept. 17.—Three bodies of the victims of the Brush Creek wreck on the Frisco Tuesday morning, near Lebanon, yet are unidentified. No more bodies have been found, however, and it is believed the number of deaths stated in yesterday morning's Springfield Republican, 27, will not be increased by further search. Train service has been resumed.

Most of the bodies were shipped from Lebanon yesterday to the homes of the dead. The three unidentified still are in the morgue at Lebanon. They are:

Woman, about 40 years old; reddish brown hair. Wore opal ring inscribed John to Louisa.


Man, about 50 years old. Wore class pin with initials "E. T. W."

Boy, about eighteen months old.

None of the injured is in the hospital, either at Lebanon or in Springfield. Those who escaped the waters that rushed into the overturned chair car and combination coach, except for the shock and exposure, practically were unhurt. Few received severe injuries.

KANSAS CITY MAN COMMITS MURDER AND SUICIDE

Ernest Cole Shoots His Wife And Then Turns Gun On Self

Ernest Cole and his wife were found dead at their home in Kansas City, Sunday morning, having been shot by Mr. Cole himself it is believed, on Saturday night. His wife, Lillie, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Powers, who live three miles east of Monett.

It is said that Cole left a letter for his mother saying that he meant to commit the deed. The relatives here do not know the motive for the tragedy.

The body of Mrs. Cole was brought to the home of her parents, Wednesday and funeral services were held at Arnold Chapel on Thursday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Powers have lived in this vicinity two years coming here from Kansas City.

AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

Just as he started to pass another automobile he had a blow-out and his car swerved into the path of the other car.
