REV. J. F. KING HAS SOME IDEAS ON BOOZE

Rev. King preached a powerful sermon on Booze Sunday morning and no soldier could have a more determined look in his eye than he did when he faced the congregation.

Although it was uncomfortably warm in the church people forgot that in their eagerness to hear Rev. King as he told of the curse of the saloon. He said, "This is not a business proposition although things could be said about the saloon being a bad business proposition to such an extent as to make the wets sit up and take notice—if they were able to sit up... This is not a business fight, it is a moral fight! The morals are more important than anything else. What would it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul? Fifty-five out of the eighty-two criminals in Barry county were from Monett and twelve out of the other twenty-seven were on their way home from Monett.

Of course the church and the saloon can not prosper at the same time. The saloons have thrived in this town, hence its bad name. When Mr. Meeker quit the church he took up the saloon argument. Did you notice that he couldn't take the two together? Never has religion had such a wave in Monett as in 1915, that is why I believe the saloons will go.

Until a few years ago Monett never had a decent church and even now they do not have a church large enough to seat the crowds, as was shown one night when Rev. Jeter preached in the Baptist church.

Then Rev. King told about the change in Aurora when saloons were voted out. When they had saloons there were not decent school grounds but afterwards several lots were purchased so children had plenty of room to play.

The difference in attendance in school in Aurora when saloons were voted out was 50 per cent. And 10.8 per cent more children go to school in dry place than in wet places. The assessments were reduced \$165,000 in one year in Aurora and no one can say anything against the town.

The talk of it ruining Monett is a joke because there are only one or two streets in town that an auto can run over with comfort, and Monett people go and drive over streets of Aurora and other towns.

The graduates came to graduation this year with school windows knocked out and building sadly in need of paint. In fact what has Monett to be proud of?

It will take years to live down the reputation of the town and I for one mean to fight with all my power to make it a good town because I believe it has a great future with so many good people in it.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

Notice of a special election is hereby given to be held under the provisions of Article 3, Chapter 63, of the Revised Statutes of Missouri 1909, commonly known as the Local Option Law, to determine whether or not spirituous and intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, shall be sold within the corporate limits of the city of Monett, in the County of Barry, and State of Missouri.

Whereas, on the 11th day of May, 1915, a petition was filed and received by the City Council of the City of Monett, in the County of Barry and State of Missouri, signed by S. E. Arnold, Bud Russell, A. L. Brown, Joe A. Russell, W. F. Brice, C. E. Whitlatch, W. C. Ivey, and others, praying for a special election to be held in said city to determine whether or not spirituous and intoxicating liquors including wine and beer should be sold within the corporate limits of said city and on the 11th day of May, 1915, the following among other proceedings were had by the Council of said city to wit:

Resolution No. 23
Resolution calling a special election in the City of Monett, Missouri, to determine whether or not spirituous and intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, shall be sold within the corporate limits of said city.

Be it resolved by the Council of the City of Monett, Missouri, as follows: Whereas, S. E. Arnold, Bud Russell, A. L. Brown, Joe A. Russell, W. F. Brice, C. E. Whitlatch, W. C. Ivey, and other qualified voters of the city of Monett, Missouri, present and file their petition to the City Council of the City of Monett, in the County of Barry and State of Missouri, praying for a special election to be held in said city, as provided by Article three (3) of Chapter sixty-three (63) of the Revised Statutes of Missouri 1909, commonly known as the Local Option Law, to determine whether or not spirituous and intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, shall be sold within the corporate limits of said city, and

Whereas, the said city council having seen, considered and heard said petition and being fully advised in the premises doth find said petition is signed by one-tenth of the qualified voters who reside within the corporate limits of said city, and that said city now has a population of twenty-five hundred inhabitants or more. It is therefore ordered by the Council of the City of Monett, Missouri, that a special election be held in said city at the usual polling places therein at which city elections are held, on Wednesday, the 16th day of June, 1915, to determine whether or not spirituous and intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, shall be sold within the corporate limits of said city, and the tickets to be voted by the voters at said election shall have written or printed thereon, those desiring to vote against the sale of intoxicating liquors, the words: "AGAINST THE SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS."

And those desiring to vote for the sale of intoxicating liquors, the words: "FOR THE SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS."

It is further ordered by the council that said election shall be conducted, the returns thereof made, and the results thereof ascertained and determined, according in all respects with the laws of this state governing general elections and the ordinances of said city, and the results thereof shall be entered upon the records of said city and the expenses of said election shall be paid out of the treasury of said city in the same manner as the expenses of other municipal elections.

Be it further ordered by the council that the City Clerk shall prepare the proper notice of the holding of said special election and shall publish the same in the Monett Weekly Times, a weekly newspaper published in the City of Monett for four consecutive weeks, the last insertion of said notice shall be within ten days next before the day of said election.

It is further ordered by the Council that the City Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to have the proper number of tickets and ballots separately printed as in this resolution specified and set forth and that he also procure proper poll books, tally sheets and other necessary supplies for said election.

This resolution shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and approval.
