CIRCUIT COURT IN SESSION AT CASSVILLE

Change of Venue Taken in Monett Local Option Contest Case

The regular July term of the Barry county circuit court convened Wednesday. Judge Carr McNatt, Sheriff G. M. Brixey, Clerk J. L. Vanhorn, Prosecuting Attorney J. T. Burgess and Stenographer J. T. McClure all present.

The five parole cases on the first day's docket were continued.

Frank Julius Rehwinkel, John Andrew Rehwinkel and Alexander I. B. Latto, were admitted to citizenship.

Laura Schneider vs J. P. S. Planchon, partition, Frank Mermoud, Sig Solomon and Bernice Withers appointed commissioners to make partition of land. Plaintiff and defendant declared to be tenants in common, plaintiff for one-third and defendant for two-thirds interest in land.

A motion for a change of venue in the Monett Local Option election case was heard and motion granted. The plaintiffs, by their attorneys, have not yet decided to what county the case will be taken.

THAW DECLARED SANE BY TRIAL JURY

Wins Verdict After a Nine Year Fight in the Courts

New York, July 14.—Harry K. Thaw was declared sane by a jury today which for nearly three weeks listened to testimony given in the supreme court here before Justice Peter Hendrick. Forty-eight minutes were consumed and two ballots taken in reaching a verdict.

Justice Hendrick on Friday morning will announce whether the commitment upon which Thaw was incarcerated in the state hospital for the criminal insane at Matteawan shall be vacated, thereby giving to the slayer of Stanford White the liberty for which he has fought in the courts for nine years. It was at the end of a day of addresses by counsel and the charge of the justice that the jury retired. While the twelve men were deliberating the crowd in the court room and about the courthouse was augmented by scores of people who believed that a quick verdict would be found.

In explaining why two ballots were taken, one of the jurors, Paul J. Marks, said that on the first ballot the verdict was eleven to one that Thaw was sane. The dissenting juror said he cast his ballot that way more as a matter of form than anything else so that the verdict would not be rendered without formal discussion. The vote was unanimous on the second ballot.

Mr. Marks also said that he and the other members of the jury believe that Thaw was eccentric and possibly mentally weak, but they did not believe he would harm anyone else.

WM. H. COLEMAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Coroner F. J. Bingham received a telephone message early this morning from Saginaw saying that Judge Wm. H. Coleman, an old and well known citizen of that place, had committed suicide at about 5 o'clock a. m. today by shooting himself in the head with a 38-calibre revolver.

Coroner Bingham at once went to Saginaw to hold an inquest.

It is said that Judge Coleman has been in bad health for some time but apparently was feeling much better last night than usual, as he seemed in a happy frame of mind and went to bed feeling all right to all appearances. What caused him to kill himself is not known.

Judge Coleman has been Justice of the Peace in his township for many years and was widely known and highly respected. He has many friends in Neosho and all over the county who will be shocked and grieved to learn of his death.—Neosho Democrat, July 14.

WILSON EXPECTED TO REACH CAPITAL TUESDAY MORNING

Decision On Policy Probably Will Be Reached at Cabinet Meeting Tuesday and Communication Sent By Last of Week

Washington, July 14.—There was no outward development today to indicate that progress was being made here towards framing an answer to the last German note on submarine warfare but it is known that officials are at work setting down views on the situation in definite form for presentation to President Wilson on his return.

The general belief is that the president will be here for a regular cabinet meeting Tuesday and that he may bring with him from Cornish, N. H., a memorandum or a rough draft of the note to Germany. He will exchange views first with Secretary Lansing who, it is believed, also has mapped out a draft of a note. Decision on the policy to be followed probably will be reached at the cabinet meeting and the new note may be completed by the end of next week.

Before the president returns Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, will call on Secretary Lansing to explain at length the viewpoint of his government. The ambassador recommended to his foreign office that inclusion in the last note of those paragraphs expressing the hope that the United States and Germany would work together for the adoption of the principle of freedom of the sea.

PLAN FOR FRISCO TO BE ANNOUNCED

St. Louis, July 14.—Albert T.
