THE BUTTERFIELD BOOTLEGGER

The man Howe who was convicted on the charge of "bootlegging" and sent to jail had a woman with him whom he claimed as his sister and who was confined to her bed with an infant about three days old, and also a little boy about two years old who was sick. Some of the charitable women of the town found them helpless, sick and in very destitute circumstances, but a collection of food and money was soon taken and a nurse secured to look after them until the woman is able to be up. The woman is reluctant in giving out anything concerning themselves and but very little is known of them. The man had part of a gallon of whiskey in his possession when arrested which he dropped and spilled. He came to this place in May and started a little barber and shoe cobbling shop. It is the opinion of some that he is a "professional." A tent which occupied a very conspicuous place in town and which was the lodging place of two men and two boys, was hurriedly hauled down and taken to the depot for shipment and the parties walked out of town immediately after the trial and conviction of the man on a bootlegging charge.
