FRISCO PLANNING BIG IMPROVEMENTS IN MONETT

A Thorough Overhauling of Tracks of the Yards Will Begin This Week

Yardmaster Bruton informs us that there is now in the Frisco yards ten car loads of rails and five carloads of ties preparatory to a thorough relaying of the tracks in the yards.

At least twenty-five workmen will arrive here this week to begin the work which will last a month at least.

He informs us that the passenger tracks will also be lengthened in order to accommodate the extra long trains that are being handled this year.

A survey has been made for the new freight depot and transfer sheds which will be placed near where the berry sheds are now located. The present sheds are of sufficient size to accommodate 45 cars at one time and the new sheds will be as large or larger.

When the present freight house and sheds are removed the ground will be used for car repair work and new buildings will be erected. A number of the small buildings now on the right of way will be demolished and the offices removed to the shop repair building.

In June of this year there were handled 2000 more cars of freight in the yards than was handled last year and this was done at \$1,000 less expense, which shows to what a fine degree of perfection the handling of freight has reached.

When the new buildings have been completed and the yards and trackage improved the handling of freight will be even better than it is now.
