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STATE DEMOCRATIC DOPE

The United States Steel Company has announced a raise in wages for 140,000 of its employes. It was a big bunch of bad news to the wailing calamity wailers. Their dying groans can scarcely be heard in the distance.

The State Treasurer has paid every warrant against the state the minute it was presented at the Treasury Department. Not a single warrant went to protest. On January first there was approximately four million dollars in the treasury, and one hundred eighty thousand dollars in the general revenue. There was no deficit as predicted by the G-D and P-D, and there will be none. How many counties and cities in the state have paid all warrants and have a cash balance? This fine condition of state affairs didn't just happen. There has been good management somewhere. The Major administration did it and is coming out with flying colors, notwithstanding the carping critics and fork-tongued falsifiers.

The quietest bunch in the state at this time is the school-fund loot liars. Since the Supreme Court settled the legal questions involved in the matter and the State Auditor has made a supplemental apportionment, giving the public schools the largest amount they ever received in the history of the state, the Globe-Democrat and Post-Dispatch have closed up like clams. They knew the schools were never in danger of losing a dollar, but they thought they saw a good opportunity to misrepresent a Democratic administration, and injure the Democratic party. The result is highly gratifying to the people. A "looting" that gives to the schools a record amount is just to the people's liking.

The Wilson program of preparedness, is a modest one and will not add to the burdens of the people. It will not result in militarism and endanger the liberties of the masses. If the American people must choose between this program and the extreme militaristic one advocated by Roosevelt, they will accept the former by a large majority. The Roosevelt program proposes to destroy individual liberty, subordinate everything to militarism and mobilize all the resources of the country for war preparedness. The army and navy would be the absolute and arbitrary power in the nation. German militarism would be a gentle summer zephyr compared with this cyclonic movement.
