Cattle—Although the market has been active this week, the opening session was inclined to show weakness due to the fact that the run here, as well as at the other western markets, was the heaviest in some time. However, the trade since has shown a general improvement, having a broad outlet from all sources, which has strengthened the trade sufficiently to off-set the early weakness, thus leaving the market at a stationary level compared with the highest point in the history of the trade, at which last week's market closed.

Hogs—The supply was liberal and quality good. Market opened very weak and slow on all grades, but in a short while livened up on the good weight hogs, at which time we sold a car of 300-pounders at \$16.55, a new record upon this market. The trade, however, after that session settled, closing fully 5c lower on the good-weight hogs and 25c lower on pigs. Choice hogs 180 lbs. up \$16.15 to \$16.55; mixed hogs 160 lbs. up \$15.85 to \$16.10; 120 to 140-lb. pigs \$13.75 to \$15; lighter pigs \$9 to \$13.25; choice rough hogs \$15.40 to \$15.65, and half fat roughs \$10 to \$13.

Sheep—With further progression towards still higher levels, the market established a new record basis today when we sold a full car of clipped Montana lambs (Missouri fed) at \$14.75 per cwt., the trade in general being 15 to 25c higher than last week's close. Clipped lambs \$16 to \$16.75; good to choice clipped ewes \$13 to \$13.75; choice clipped bucks \$11.25 to \$12; medium clipped sheep \$9.50 to \$11; choppers \$7.50 to \$9; canners \$4.50 to \$7.

Goats—Choice fat kids \$10.50 to \$11.50, and choice aged goats at \$8.50 to \$10.00.

SEVENTEEN ARE HURT IN WRECK

Motor Car Crashes Into Freight—Woman Aids Injured Passengers

An open switch at Seligman, Mo., caused a wreck of a Missouri & North Arkansas motor car running between here and Helena, Ark., at 7 o'clock last Saturday night. Seventeen persons were injured.

A string of freight cars was standing on the siding and the motor car crashed into the rear car, wrecking the motor car, smashing out all the windows and throwing the passengers to the floor.

Conductor S. R. Merren suffered the most severe injuries, having three ribs broken. Many of the passengers were knocked unconscious and badly cut. They were given medical attention in Seligman. The engine of the freight was coupled onto the motor car, which continued on the way after about two hours.

Mrs. Lark Shaeffer, wife of the yard engineer at Harrison, Ark., who was a passenger on the car, performed heroic service in taking care of the injured. She, by chance, had a "first aid" kit at hand and took charge of the injured until they were able to obtain medical attention.—Joplin Globe.

MORE VOLUNTEERS EXPECTED IN MARINE CORPS

Washington, May 22.—An immediate jump in volunteer enlistments in the United States Marine Corps is expected by officials of the Corps as a result of the sending of a regiment of "soldiers of the sea" to France with the first expedition and the assurance that further contingents will be sent as rapidly as transportation can be procured.

Many young men who had previously not wanted to enlist with a probability of being kept in this country an indefinite time and perhaps never getting to the firing line will, it is believed, now enter their country's service as "soldiers and sailors, too."

The Marine Corps expects to reach its full war strength of 30,000 men by the Fourth of July.
