

DR. DAVIDSON'S DAILY ADDRESSES A TREAT

Conference Enjoying Dr. Davidson's Talks—Many Other Good Numbers on the Program.

Every afternoon at 4 o'clock, Dr. W. J. Davidson, of the Garrett Biblical Institute, gives a lecture on some phase of Christian education. These are among the best numbers on the conference program. On Wednesday afternoon the doctor's subject was "Intellectual Attack on the Dead Line." In order to ward off the time of reaching the "dead line," a minister or any other person must keep abreast of the times, keep his intellect bright and his language interesting.

His subject today is "Biography of a Sermon." Tomorrow he will lecture on "The Church in the Community." The subject was the claims of the super-annuated ministers and their families. The conference quartet made its first appearance at this meeting and the music was much appreciated.

Thursday morning Bishop Cook in his sermon took as his subject, "Gideon." Later in the session he spoke on "The Religious Work of Women."

This afternoon F. B. Fisher, of the Board of Missions, presented the Centenary program. He used motion pictures and slides to illustrate his lecture.

Tonight G. A. Robbins, of the Lincoln Boulevard church, of Kansas City, will speak on "Making Democracy Safe for the World." This will be a patriotic session. G. A. Robbins will preside.

Tomorrow morning Bishop Cook will speak at 8:30 o'clock. In the afternoon Dr. Fletcher Homan will give an address in regard to Woman's Foreign Missionary societies. Mrs. J. M. McPherrin will preside.

At 6:45 the Marionville College alumni and friends will be entertained at a banquet in the basement. Rev. Oswald is the president of the alumni association and has the banquet in charge.

On Friday evening the address will be made by Joseph C. Nate.

On Saturday night conference was merged into a grand patriotic rally in honor of the launching of the Fourth Liberty Loan campaign. The public was invited to the service and the large church was crowded. F. P. Sizer, chairman of the Barry county campaign, presided over the meeting.

Bishop R. J. Cooke gave the address. He had received a part of his education in a German university and had been a deep student of history leading up to the present war. He spoke with authority on the leading questions of today with a fine patriotism that was inspiring. The address was one of the greatest Monett people have ever had the privilege of hearing.

On Sunday, Methodist ministers were invited to fill the different pulpits of the town and at all services the church-goers were given a treat. Bishop Cooke preached the sermon at the Methodist church in the morning.

Sunday afternoon memorial services for deceased ministers of the conference were held. The Bishop then ordained five deacons of the conference.

At night, Dr. Williams, of Chicago, gave a wonderful temperance address before an immense audience. Dr. Williams is an orator of great power and delighted his hearers with his wit, rathos and common sense.

VOLUNTEER SUBSCRIPTIONS IN THIS CITY NET \$40,000

Monett Subscribes Nearly One-Third of Quota on First Day—Solicitors Make Progress.

Monett is making a good showing in the Fourth Liberty Loan campaign. Saturday, volunteer day, the citizens subscribed for \$40,000 worth of bonds, which is almost one-third of the quota for the township. This is an excellent showing for a railroad town on the day before payday, and Monett will have no trouble securing the full amount of her quota of \$125,561.

Volunteer subscriptions were received at both banks and at Tutt & Osborn's store. At Tutt & Osborn's clothing store, Mrs. Harry Osborn had charge of a booth and sold \$5,200 worth of Liberty Bonds. At the First National Bank, Mrs. B. A. Beckham and Mrs. O. H. Hudson received subscriptions to the amount of \$18,000. At the State Bank, Miss Winnie Taylor and Miss Ruby Waite sold \$12,500 worth of the bonds.

W. H. Gimson, general foreman of the Frisco mechanical department at Monett, received \$4,850 in voluntary subscriptions. The Durnil Dry Goods Company turned in \$1,000 from the firm and employes. Other business houses have made liberal subscriptions, which have not yet been reported.
