ONLY TWENTY MISSOURI COUNTIES HEARD FROM

Illinois Also Slow in Reporting But State Chairman are Confident of Success.

St. Louis, April 28.—Reports from Missouri continue slow, only 20 counties out of 94 having sent in returns, five of which have passed the goal.

Green County with a subscription of a million dollars has raised more than one-half of its quota. Cole County also has passed the one-half way of its big allotment, of \$760,450. Polk county has subscribed \$300,000 of its \$379,200 quota.

State Chairman Hughes says in some counties the Victory Liberty Loan campaigns are having difficulty convincing the small subscribers that it is just as vitally necessary that they should buy Victory Loan notes as it was for them to buy bonds in previous loans.

The people are being urged to realize that this is a popular Loan and that the bankers must not be expected to tie up their funds and thus handicap ordinary business. The banks must have their funds available to lend to the merchants and farmers.
