SANATORIUM MANAGER DAMAGE CASE DISMISSED

After remaining on the docket more than two years, a libel action of Carlos C. English against the Pulitzer Publishing company, transferred to the Jasper county circuit court from the Lawrence county circuit court, was dismissed by Judge Grant Emerson of division No. 2.

English asking \$10,000 damages, alleging that the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, owned by the Pulitzer company committed libel when it published an article May 6, 1917, to the effect that English had been succeeded as superintendent of the Missouri state sanatorium for the treatment of incipient pulmonary tuberculosis, located at Mount Vernon, and that his removal resulted from the action of members of the sanatorium board in removing furniture from the institution for their own use, the taking of cattle from the sanatorium herd and the use of sanatorium funds to send them to the San Francisco exposition.
