### HIGHWAY THROUGH

#### HEART OF OZARKS

From the Springfield Leader. A great national highway leading from Springfield into the heart of the Ozarks and the Lake Tancycomo region to the Arkansas state line via Branson and Hollister, across the northwest corner of Arkansas, via Eureka Springs and Siloam Springs, to the Oklahoma line and on through Tulsa will next year become a reality, according to present indications.

Surveys from Springfield to the Arkansas state line have been completed and been approved by the state and federal authorities. Funds have been voted or are about to be voted in various districts and contracts will be let in the near future for completing that portion of the highway lying in Missouri. Improvements necessary between Springfield and the Arkansas line call for an estimated expenditure of \$182,250.

From Springfield to Blue Eye, on the Arkansas line, the distance is 75.10 miles.

A meeting of the Ozark Trails association has been called to meet at Siloam Springs December 1. This will be the third annual meeting since the association was organized at Branson-Hollister two years ago. The officers of the association are Wm. H. Johnson, Springfield, president; Will C. Sweet, Siloam Springs, Ark., vice president; J. C. McManima, Branson, secretary. Mr. McManima died last week at his home in Branson. His enthusiasm for the project did much to help the work along.
