

### DOUBLE FUNERAL SERVICE FOR HUSBAND AND WIFE

Mr. and Mrs. Willis Clark Die Within Three Days of Each Other. One Funeral for Both.

Willis Clark, postal clerk, died at his home, 801 Lincoln avenue at three o'clock Sunday morning, February 15, following an illness of influenza-pneumonia. He had been very low for several days, but when he regained consciousness Friday his many friends had hopes for his recovery, but he became worse Friday night and Saturday he was very low. Everything that could be done for him, was done by loving friends and three nurses.

The remains were shipped to Fayetteville, Ark., Sunday evening on No. 3, and a double funeral service was held for Mr. and Mrs. Clark, Monday afternoon and burial was made at Goshen, Ark., fifteen miles from Fayetteville. The body of Mrs. Clark, was shipped to Fayetteville Saturday night and funeral services were to have been held Sunday after-

noon. A message was sent for the relatives to hold the body until Monday afternoon when a double funeral service would be held.

The remains of Mr. Clark were accompanied to Fayetteville by his daughter, Enid, and his brother, John Clark and sister, Miss Artie Clark, of Fayetteville, Ark., who were here during the illness of Mr. Clark and his wife.

Willis Clark was born June 2, 1888, and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Clark, of Goshen, Arkansas. He was 31 years, 8 months and 13 days old at the time of his death.
