NOTICE OF ANNUAL SCHOOL ELECTION

Notice is hereby given to the qualified voters of the Monett Public School District, County of Barry and State of Missouri, that the Annual School Election of said District will be held on Tuesday, the 6th day of April, 1920.

Among other things specified by Law, the following will be proposed and considered:

FIRST—To elect two School Directors to serve for a period of three years each.

SECOND—To authorize the Board of Education to levy a tax of Sixty Cents (60c) on the \$100.00 assessed valuation of the property of said School District, in addition to the Forty-Cents (40c) specified by Law, for Teachers' Wages and Incidental Fund.

THIRD—To Authorize the Board of Education to levy a Tax of Seventy Cents (70c) on the \$100.00 assessed valuation of the property of said School District, for Building Fund to keep School property in repair and provide for Fire Insurance.

Voting Places will be at the usual places of voting in various wards of the Said School District.

Polls will be open at 7:00 o'clock a. m. and will close at 6:00 o'clock p. m. of said day.
