**SECOND ANNUAL FRUIT GROWER'S MEETING**

Arrangements have been completed for the second annual meeting of apple and strawberry growers of Northwest Arkansas to be held at Springdale on July 20, 1920.

An automobile tour will be made to the principal apple and strawberry growing sections. The trip planned will take you through over three thousand acres of apple orchards and five hundred acres of newly set strawberry which is about one-fifth of the new planting in the Springdale district. On this trip you may see and make your own comparisons between orchards under clean culture and those in sod; orchards well fertilized and orchards where no fertilizers have been used; orchards well sprayed and orchards not sprayed; orchards generally well cared for and orchards woefully neglected. All phases of orcharding and berry growing will be discussed.

Automobile transportation and an old-fashioned barbecue dinner at noon will be furnished by Springdale business men and fruit growers. A Bureau of Information will be maintained at the Post Office. Cars will assemble on the main street and will be ready to start promptly at eight o'clock.

People driving in from some distance, by automobile, should arrange to arrive in Springdale the night before. A committee will assist all who come in securing lodging. Inquire at the Bureau of Information at the Post Office.


