

### MONETT SOLDIER TO RECEIVE D. S. C.

Glen Vaught to Be Decorated for Capturing German Gun and Crew.

The Distinguished Service Cross will be presented to Glen Vaught of Monett at Jefferson Barracks, who will be presented to Glen Vaught of Monett at Jefferson Barracks at 10 o'clock Sunday morning for extraordinary heroism in action near Varennes, France, on September 26, 1918. Vaught was a Corporal in Company A, One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Field Gun Battalion. Accompanied by

another soldier, he went through heavy fire and by skillful maneuvering captured an enemy 77-millimeter gun, with part of its crew, which had been checking the advance of the American troops.

The cross will be presented by Col. Monroe McFarland, the commanding officer at Jefferson Barracks, who will be assisted by Col. John H. Parker, commander of the St. Louis recruiting district. The troops stationed at the barracks will be paraded.

### NEUTRALIZING SOIL ACIDITY MAKES BETTER LEGUME CROPS

That legume crops on some of the Webster County land which is now producing very poor alfalfa will respond to liming is well demonstrated on an experimental plot near Seymour. Four acres were sown to alfalfa and sweet clover; two acres of each. All was manured, fertilized, and limed except a strip across each plot, which was left unlimed. This spring the limed portion of the alfalfa was looking good, the limed part of the sweet clover was excellent, but the unlimed portion of each plot was a complete failure with nothing but weeds growing on it. It is quite likely that several carloads of lime will be used with wheat this fall.

### MRS. LOUIS C. STUMPF DIES

Pastor's Wife Succumbs to Kidney Trouble, Monday Morning. Burial In St. Louis.

Mrs. Louis C. Stumpf died at 11:20 o'clock, Monday morning, July 19, from kidney trouble, from which she had been a sufferer for some time. Although her health was not good she was able to be about and to take an interest in public affairs. She attended the sessions of the Chautauqua until Monday night, when she became violently ill with convulsions. She rallied somewhat from the attack, but on becoming worse Miss Pemberton Greene, a trained nurse from Springfield, was secured to attend her. The disease was too far advanced for medical or nursing skill, however, and she died, Monday morning. The body was prepared for burial at the Bradford undertaking parlors.

Mrs. Stumpf is survived by her husband, Rev. Louis C. Stumpf, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Monett, and one son, Paul.

Before her marriage to Mr. Stumpf in 1905 Mrs. Stumpf's name was Miss Alice Jane Rehfeldt. She was born in St. Louis and made her home there until after her marriage. Other members of her family now living are her brothers, A. W. Rehfeldt, a St. Louis lawyer; Charles S. Rehfeldt, a physician, and a sister, Mrs. Carrie Koch who has two daughters. The Rehfeldt family are strong church people. The father was for fifty years an officer in a St. Louis Presbyterian church. Mrs. Koch is considered one of the finest Bible students in the state and ministers consult her in regard to interpretations of scriptures and other subjects in connection with the church. Both brothers are active churchmen.

Mrs. Stumpf herself has been wonderfully active and successful in different church activities. Before her marriage she sang for many years as a professional choir singer and Christian worker. She was an excellent teacher of the Bible and could preach a sermon if necessary. In her husband's pastoral work, she has been his efficient assistant and inspiration. Her spirituality was remarkable and her faith in the power of prayer was unusual.

While Mr. Stumpf was working as Y. M. C. A. secretary at Camp Bowie during the war, Mrs. Stumpf was with him, helping with the entertainment of the soldiers, taking charge of the singing, and being a mother to the boys in camp.

Since coming with her husband to Monett in June, 1919, Mrs. Stumpf has endeared herself to the people of the town and church and the death of this saintly woman is universally mourned.

### PLATFORM OF FARMER--LABOR GROUP

Demand Recognition of Soviet Russia And Ireland. Advocate War Millions Bear Tax Burden.

Chicago, Ill., July 15.—The platform as adopted by the Labor-Farmer group and which was considered too radical by the 48-ers contains nine planks, summarized as follows.

**Americanization:** Demands the right of free speech, amnesty for political prisoners, repeal of espionage sedition and "criminal syndicalist" laws, referendum and recall for Federal Judges and all equal suffrage for all.

**Demands withdrawal of the United States from participation under the Versailles treaty in the reduction of conquered peoples to economic or political subjugation, recognition of the Republic of Ireland and the "new Russian government," abolition of secret treaties and withdrawal of the United States from the dictatorship we exercise over the Philippines, Cuba, Porto Rico, Guam and Hawaii.** This section also pledges support to "a league of free peoples."

**Demands democratic control of industries, laying down the right of labor for an increasing share in the responsibilities and management of industry."**

**Calls for public ownership of all public utilities and natural resources and immediate repeal of the Esch-Cummins railroad law.**

**Demands favorable laws for farmers, establishment of public markets, extension of federal farm loan system, organization of state and national services to guide applicants for farms and farmers already on land, and promotion of farmers' benefit organizations which "actually will help."**

**Advocates government economy to replace "extravagance that has run riot under the present administration" denouncing the system that "has created one war millionaire for every three American soldiers killed in France," demanding that war-acquired wealth be taxed so as to shift the tax burden from the poor, expressing opposition to consumption taxes and recommending steeply graded income taxes for federal revenue, and taxation of land values and sharply graduated inheritance taxes for state and local government.**

**Urges reduction of the cost of living by stabilization of currency, federal control of meat-packing industry and enforcement of present laws against profiteers, "especially the big ones."**

**Favors "justice to soldiers of the world war as a matter of right and not of charity," recommending payment of a sum "sufficient to make their war pay not less than their peace-time earnings."**

**Labor's bill of rights, which includes declarations for:**

**The unqualified rights of all workers, including government workers, to strike.**

**Freedom from compulsory arbitration.**

**Maximum standard eight-hour day and 44-hour week.**

**Old-age unemployment payments and workers' compensation to insure workers against accident and disease.**

**Abolition of employment of children under 16 years of age, complete and effective protection of women in industry, with equal pay for equal work, abolition of private employment detective agencies used against strikes and exclusion from interstate commerce of convict labor products.**

The first peaches of the Missouri crop are being shipped this week from the Chickasaw Orchard company's place at Olden, Mo., D. E. Eicher, Frisco horticultural agent, said today. The Carmen peach is the only variety ripe at present. R. C. Erb owns the controlling interest in this company.

Estimates at present are that between 50 and 60 cars of peaches will be shipped from the Koskonong-Brandsville district.—Springfield Leader.


