### SPRINGDALE HOST TO FRUIT GROWERS

Two Thousand Attend Meeting in Arkansas Eden - Tour Orchard District.

More than two thousand fruit growers attend a meeting and tour in Springdale, Ark., yesterday. Sixty-five orchards and strawberry patches were visited by 225 automobiles, in each containing five or more persons, in the morning. In the afternoon a program of speaking was held in the city park at Springdale.

A barbecue luncheon was served by the residents of Springdale and community at noon in the park. The crowd was much larger than was anticipated but arrangements were made to handle the larger number of guests in a very satisfactory manner.

The condition of the apples was a surprise to growers in more distant portions of the district. In orchards where spraying has been faithfully practiced and fertilizing materials used the yields will be much greater than was expected. Some growers expect near the crop that their orchards produced last year but these are in the minority. It is believed that the yield generally will run from 50 to 65 per cent that of last year, with quality not quite so good.

The program for the afternoon was a practical one in every way. A number of speakers covered various phases of orcharding and berry growing. The marketing problem was discussed at length and a survey of the expected yield for this year was taken—Joplin Globe.

McJIMSEY PUTS G. O. P. AHEAD OF HIS DESIRES

Missouri Editor Never Known to Bolt Sulk or Refuse to Fight the Enemy.

### FRISCO IS ENLARGING NEWBURG ROUNDHOUSE
