Effective Effort of Month Results in Aggressive Working Membership—Will Employ Agent.

Mount Vernon, Mo., Aug. 31.—Aggressive effort of one month culminated today in the organization at Mt. Vernon of the Lawrence county farm bureau, with a membership distributed in every township of the county, enrolled through a farm bureau canvass which was begun the second week in the month following a week of public speaking in interest of the project.

Chester H. Gray, president of Missouri farm bureau federation delivered an address of inspiration at the organization meeting, and the enterprise is launched auspiciously, with promise of an active and aggressive membership.

It was decided to submit the proposition of whether to hold a "comparison" or a "score card" show to a vote of the Association members. L. E. McLain, the secretary, was instructed to prepare postcards to be sent to the members on which they are to record their vote. These are to be returned immediately in order that the committee may make the necessary arrangements.

The prospects are bright for the largest and best show ever held by the Association. Many new breeders have been added to the membership and more interest is being taken in raising fine birds.
