

MOTOR DEALERS TO TOUR SOUTHWEST.

Brass Band will accompany Kansas City Auto Dealers on Tour Through Ozark Region.

The Kansas City Motor Car Dealers will make their eighth annual trade and good roads boosting tour through the Ozarks in a short time. The pathfinder car, the big six-cylinder National car, has been selected as the pathfinder car to lay out the routes and to make necessary arrangements. It left Kansas City Monday, September 27. This car carries as its passengers on this pathfinding trip E. E. Peake, secretary of the association and manager of the tour, I. T. Hill, manager of the wholesale department of the Hogan-Sullivan Motor Company Kansas City distributors of the National car and three reporters representing the Kansas City newspapers.

The exact route of the tour cannot be determined until after the pathfinding car finishes the trip. Lack of enthusiasm in the different towns may change the route or bad roads may also make a change.

LARGE AUDIENCE HEARS COL. DAN MORGAN SMITH

Col. Dan Morgan Smith, who spoke at the Methodist church Sunday afternoon, was greeted by a large audience. Although his press agent had given glowing accounts of his eloquence it was found that the stories were fully justified and all were delighted with the story of the battle of St. Mihiel. Col. Smith commanded the "Battalion of Death," 1st Battalion 358th Infantry, 90th Division A. E. F. They went into the battle with 1,120 men and came out with 927. But the name was not given them because the Huns killed so many of their men but because they killed so many of the Huns. He depicted life in the trenches, on the march, on the advance and on the battlefield. He told of the fighting in the woods, hand-to-hand conflicts and the brave things the officers and men of his command did.

The Colonel was greeted with frequent applause. When he completed his lecture with an appeal for contributions to aid in financing the World Prohibition Movement, the response was generous.

Col. Morgan lectures under the auspices of the Anti-Saloon League of America. He spoke at Springfield at 11 o'clock Sunday morning, came by automobile to Monett for the 3:30 o'clock meeting here and left immediately after his lecture for an overnight trip to Neosho, where he spoke at night. He then started for Jefferson City where he had an appointment Monday night.

MISSOURIANS INVITED TO FISH HATCHERY DEDICATION

Springfield, Mo., Sept. 27.—The State Fish Hatchery to be established at Sequoia Park, near this city will be dedicated Friday, October 1. The arrangements are under the supervision of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, and the program will include an address by Governor F. D. Gardner, who will speak in the afternoon.

The Governor's address will be followed by a big fish fry, when fish and other eatables will be provided for everybody free of charge by the Chamber of Commerce. In the evening there will be an elaborate entertainment, replete with novel features.

Committees of the Chamber of Commerce have been busy for several days upon the various features of the entertainment, and the Refreshment Committee has estimated that 5,000 fish will be required to serve the throng expected to attend.

Dr. T. T. Umbarger, chairman of the General Committee, has announced that every Missourian is invited, and delegates are expected to motor to Springfield from almost every town in the Ozark region.

The establishment of the fish hatchery is certain to increase the advantages already enjoyed by the Ozark streams as fisherman's paradise.

COUNTY AGENTS ARE BUSY CULLING

Many of the county agents in Missouri are conducting intensive poultry culling campaigns. County Agent, R. A. Kinnaird, of Nodaway County, has scheduled one hundred demonstrations. County Agent R. S. Clough has hired a trained poultryman for a month to assist him in culling the farm flocks of Johnson County.

The culling campaign conducted in Newton County by County Agent I. J. Wormington has resulted in seven applications from farmers in the county to have their flocks listed as certified flocks. Pedigreed male birds will be placed on these farms and the best of the cockerels and pullets hatched next spring will be banded to be sold as certified breeding stock.



Cover the grain with a blanket for several hours, then uncover and stir occasionally until it is dry, when it is ready for seeding."
